The Supreme Curse.

The saloon is the supreme curse of the nineteenth century, because its influence extends in all directions; and wherever it is felt, human misery, degradation and moral eclipse follow. "It is the devil-fish of our great civilization, whose every tentacle crushes to death. It pollutes politics it degrades manhood; it makes a possible murderer of every victim; it fills the slums with want and wretchedness; it crowds to overflowing our jails, and is a leading factor in populating insane asylums, alms-houses, and potter's field; it beclouds the intellect; it obliterates moral integrity. But towering above all this, its crowning evil and that which makes its existence the national crime of the age, is its effect upon the guiltless. Through it, more innocent suffer than guilty. The wife, the prattling children, and the unborn child, each bear the mark of its curse. This is the phase of the problem which makes its toleration a crime of measureless proportions."

SAN FRANCISCO, May 13.—Wilhelm Boetner sailed for Honolulu yesterday on the steamer Australia as the advance guard for a German colony of fruit eaters, who believe in a diet of fruit and herbs, and in the costume of Eden before the fall.

Boetner is searching for some island where the colony may demonstrate its theory without conflict.

He is rich and an ex-officer in the German army, and, though dressing in the height of fashion, he wears no hat, as he

wishes to become accustomed to the tropical sun. Just before sailing he said:

"My idea in going to the tropics is to live as near nature as possible. The climate there is suited to my plans.

"You know a man cannot go naked in a country where icicles form in his whiskers, but I will be happy in Hawaii.

"Back in Germany I have friends, fruit-eaters we call ourselves, who will come on and join the colony if I report favorably. Just what form of government we will adopt cannot be announced at present. The main object in founding the colony is to return to the life of primitive man, eat nothing but fruit and herbs, indulge in no exertion greater than breathing and wear no garments of any description. Therein lies true happiness."

Boetner expects to get control of an island and bring over the pioneers in a few months.

The Stump in Hay.

A big exporter who last autumn covered all the available hay space for May and June on the Allas, Dominion, Beaver, Donaldson and Thompson steamlines is wishing now he had left well enough alone. He expected to ship 30,000 tons during these two months and had contracted for its delivery. The rates he had contracted to pay for his space were as follows: 37 shillings and sixpence to Glasgow; 42s 6d to London, and 40s to Liverpool and Bristol. Since the opening of navigation, however, the hay markets on the other side have gone to pieces, and it is said that were the exporter in question to fill his contracts he would stand to lose one hundred thousand dollars. The result is that he has been forced to cancel all his contracts, the steamship men having come to his assistance. This has had the effect of demoralizing freights still more. Hay space is being offered by the steamship companies at from 20 to 25 shillings a ton. It was stated around the harbor to-day that space for 400 tons had been engaged on a regular line steamer which left port on Saturday at 40 shillings a ton. The steamer referred to had to sail with 200 tons, for which the agents only got 15 shillings.—Montreal Star.

America's Big Oyster Crop.

The luscious bivalve is evidently Maryland's oyster. Of the 35,000,000 bushels of oysters produced in the world each year nearly 30,000,000 bushels are natives of the United States, and more than 11,000,000 bushels come from Maryland waters.
