—Mr. John Stevenson visited Moncton, Saturday.  
 —Miss Emily Sayre has returned home from Halifax.  
 —Mr. James Starrak, of Harcourt, was in town Monday.  
 —Mrs. Jones, of Woodstock, is visiting at Mr. J. F. Atkinson's.  
 —Mr. Stephen Cameron has removed from Kingston to Cameron's Mills.  
 —Mr. Henry O'Leary has shipped nine carloads of lobsters so far this season.  
 —Dr. R. P. Doherty, dentist, will make his regular trip to Kent County this month.  
 —Mr. Adam Coates last week bought a carload of potatoes in St. Louis, for shipment to Boston.  
 —Complaints are made that the bridge at the mouth of the Black River is in a very dangerous condition.  
 —It was reported Friday morning that Buctouche had been again burned down. The report happily proved to be untrue.  
 —Mrs. George Jardine, of Kingston, is recovering from a severe attack of erysipelas. Miss Brait has also been seriously ill.  
 —Lobsters are very scarce. The catch of salmon has also been small. Shad have not been as plentiful in these waters for years.  
 —Donald Hutchinson is visiting friends in Kingston and Richibucto after an absence of thirty years in the United States.  
 —Mr. William Storer of New York arrived in Richibucto, Friday, to spend a few weeks with his brother Mr. A. C. Storer.  
 —At Kingston, Saturday afternoon the Richibucto amateur baseball club defeated the Kingston amateurs with a score of 20 to 19.  
 —A few mackerel have been caught in the herring nets along the shore. This is very early for mackerel to make their appearance.  
 —The jail has not for some time been without an occupant. The three last prisoners of the hospitality of Sheriff Leger have hailed from Buctouche.  
 —Captain Shand, of the schooner Henry Swan, was in Richibucto last week, while his vessel was awaiting her turn to discharge a cargo of coal in Chatham.  
 —Rev. L. Jos. Ouellet, of St. Mary, was in town last Wednesday. Father Ouellet is at the head of the St. Mary's creamery enterprise and is in hopes that it will be a decided success. Operations will begin this week.  
 —Dr. R. L. Botsford of Moncton, formerly of Richibucto, was married at Moncton last week to Mrs. Ella Newman. The ceremony was performed by Rev. John Prince. Only the intimate friends of the contracting parties were present.  
 —Rev. Arthur Slipper, of the Church of England, at Harcourt, has received a call to Holy Trinity Church, St. Martins. It is understood the reverend gentleman will accept. Mr. Slipper, who is from England, is very popular wherever he goes.  
 —About four o'clock Saturday morning Mr. H. T. Colpitts awoke to find the house full of smoke. On searching he found the kitchen on fire. A spark from the stove had evidently fallen on the floor and when discovered a large hole was burned through the floor. A few buckets of water extinguished the flames before any further damage was done.
