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tended for. This principle should guide the House in the resolution. If a charge was made against a judge it ought to be made in the regular way. The person making the charge out to go and have the courage to prove it. It was beneath the dignity of this house to go outside of its legitimate power to assault the characters of judges who sentenced Ellis. Should the house do so it would deserve the contempt which would fall upon it (hear, hear and loud cheers).

After Sir John took his seat the Opposition, realizing that no reply was possible, put up Casey, who spoke against time.

He was followed by McLeod and Davin against Davies' amendment.

Then Mr. Laurier spoke briefly on the general question of the right of judges to punish for contempt.

McCarthy closed the debate, taking strong ground against the amendment and supporting the contention of Sir John Thompson.

Division was then taken with the following result: For 66, against 110. McCarthy and O'Brien voted with the government.

OTTAWA, June 7.—Upon the opening of the house to-day, the committee on privileges and elections reported that two important witnesses in the Turcotte case had disobeyed their subpoenas and failed to appear for examination. Mr. Edgar thereupon moved that J. B. Prevost and C. E. Larose, the two witnesses complained of, be summoned to appear before the bar of the house on Monday next.

Sir Hector Langevin suggested that perhaps witnesses neglected to appear because their travelling fees were not ordered them.

Sir John Thompson asked if, in the province of Quebec, crown witnesses were tendered their fees before giving their evidence?

Mr. Choquette said they were not and that it had been decided that it need not be.

Sir John then read from Bourinot on the practice of parliament. It is true they may not know the parliamentary practice, but they could be informed of it with the summons. It should be borne in mind that the motion was not for their arrest but for a summons.

After some further discussion the motion passed.

On motion to go into committee of ways and means the adjourned debate on Charlton's motion respecting Northwest lands was resumed.

Hon. Mr. Daly spoke up to recess, making a powerful defense of the government's land policy and a very crushing exposure of the inconsistency between grit professions now and their practice when in power. He also contrasted the land policies of the two parties and the results achieved and pointed out the superiority of the land policy in force in Canada with the policy of the United States, to which Charlton was continually referring.

After recess Mr. Daly concluded his speech and was followed by Messrs. Martin, Davin and Mills of Bothwell.

The house divided at one o'clock, when Charlton's amendment was defeated, 47 to 100.

The House then adjourned.

#### Considers Canada a Nuisance.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—The senate today considered the tariff bill. The question was on the amendments offered yesterday by Senators Hale and Peffer to the lumber schedule. Mr. Peffer said Canada's products were the same as our own. Reciprocity with Spanish-American republics was possible; with Canada impossible. Politically Canada, if not a menace, was at least a nuisance to the United States. There was no reason, political or commercial, why she should be especially favored in our tariff legislation. It could not be done except to the detriment of our home products. The bill proposed to discriminate against our sister republics, which so especially deserved our consideration, in favor of a British colony which deserved it as little. Mr. Peffer declared that almost every disagreeable international complication with which this country was burdened for years had grown out of Canada. We could get along with Canada as an independent power; but as a British dependency she

was and would be perpetually a cause of irritation, possibly of serious trouble.

He intimated that Canada must in time become independent or part of the American union. He referred to the preparations Great Britain was making on this continent against the contingency of war, which, if it ever came, would end British jurisdiction on this continent forever.

Mr. Peffer said he did not believe in discrimination against Canada in tariff legislation to force her to some desired result. He believed our relations with her require us not to legislate in her interest against ourselves. This bill, besides its donations to Canada favored British interests in many other ways at the expense of our own people, and would do more than anything else which occurred within the present generation to perpetuate British power on this continent.

After discussion Senators Hale and Peffer's amendments were severally rejected, 17 to 27.

Mr. Hale offered another amendment reducing the existing duty on sawed lumber from \$2 to \$1 per thousand feet. This amendment was also rejected, 14 to 30.

Mr. Allen (Rep., Neb.), offered an amendment putting on the free list logs, lumber, shingles and such building materials as are commonly used in the construction of dwelling houses, barns and fences. Without action on Mr. Allen's amendment, the bill was laid aside, with an arrangement, by unanimous consent, that the lumber schedule be disposed of Thursday without further discussion.
