Uncle Rastus Made the Papers come to His Peculiar Habits.

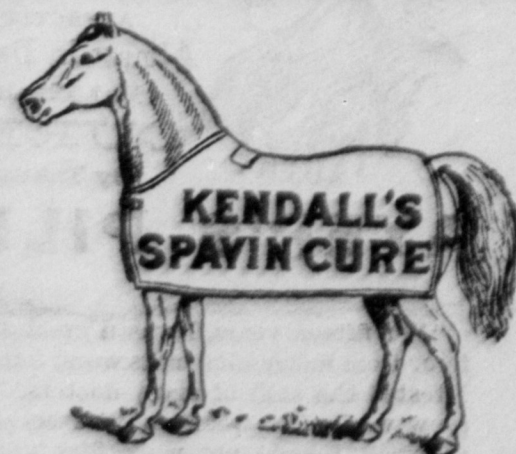
Uncle Rastus was intently gazing at a newspaper when some of the young men from the factory passed the doorstep on which he was sitting.
