

LOCAL NEWS.

VITAL STATISTICS.—The returns of Robert Hutchinson, registrar of births, marriages and deaths, show 398 births 177 deaths and 97 marriages in Kent County during the past six months.

PORT OF RICHIBUCTO.—The following is a total of the vessels and tonnage registered in this port for the year 1893:—Newly registered 2; struck off 2; total vessels 16; total tonnage 1598; decrease in tonnage 1986.

ILLNESS OF MR. H. IRVING.—News reached here last week of the serious illness of Mr. H. Irving, of Buctouche, of pneumonia. Mr. Irving, who had been on a trip to Boston visited Richmond, Carleton Co., on his return, and was there taken ill. J. D. Irving, R. A. Irving, and Miss Irving left for Richmond last Friday. A telegram received here Tuesday, states that he is somewhat better.

REPLEVIN CASE.—The case of Charlotte Wood vs. Magliore Legere, an action of replevin to recover possession of a cow, came before a Sheriff's jury, Thursday. The cow in question had been seized by a constable under an execution issued for delinquent school taxes against Ira Hicks of Little River, Buctouche. Plaintiff claimed that she owned the cow and brought action against the purchaser. The jury found for the plaintiff. H. H. James appeared for plaintiff and C. J. Sayre for defendant.

VIOLATION OF THE GAME LAWS.—It would appear that the game law is a dead letter in New Brunswick. The Campbellton correspondent of the Transcript writes:—"Mr. Jack Gallant on a tramp for partridge yesterday, only two miles from town, came across a drove of five caribou. Not one escaped, some of them having beautiful sets of antlers." A few days ago a drove of nine caribou, was met a few miles west of Kent Junction, and the whole drove slaughtered by a man whose name has not been given. Where is our game warden?

COUNTY COURT.—There will be a large criminal docket for the county court which meets here next Tuesday. The trial of the three Goguens concerned in the Cyprien shooting case will take place, if the injured man is able to be present to give evidence. Wm. Doyle, who has been lying in jail for three months on a charge of assault, and Wm. Gould and Jude J. Savoy, charged with breaking into J. D. Irving's store and stealing a quantity of goods will also be tried. The civil docket will probably be small. This will be Judge Well's first visit to Kent County since his appointment.

HEIRS TO A FORTUNE.—Mr. Joseph DeGrasse, of St. Louis, is excited over a report that he is one of the heirs to an immense fortune in France. The Count DeGrasse, an old French Admiral, died in Paris in 1788, leaving an estate valued at \$32,000,000. His brother had emigrated to this country and settled near Bay Chaleur. Rival claimants to the estate appeared, and for nearly a hundred years the matter has been in litigation. Word has been received that a final settlement of the matter has been reached and that the estate will be divided among the heirs in the course of a few weeks. There are about forty claimants in New Brunswick, most of whom live in Gloucester county.

A WARNING.—Bass River, and P. River Corner especially, has always been noted for rowdyism, but there have been no burglaries, such as are becoming so common in other places, to report until very recently.

Suspicious looking characters have been watched and identified prowling round the Post Office, and store of Mrs. D. McKendrick, and on several occasions one or more parties effected an entrance after night through the back door. At first nothing was said about it, as it was supposed he was on friendly terms with one of the inmates of the house, but about this time sums of money and articles of clothing began to disappear, and it is now thought he must have been trying to enter the house for the purpose of theft, assisted as there is grave cause to fear, by an accomplice in the house.

Patience has at last ceased to be a virtue, and the parties are warned that if there is a repetition of these clandestine meetings, or any further attempt to open doors which were previously locked and bolted securely, there will be no leniency shown. At present the names are withheld on account of the youth and respectable connections of the offenders.

Alban Robichaud, of Buctouche, who was ordained priest a few weeks ago, is temporarily in charge of Rev. L. J. Ouillet's church in St. Mary, during the latter's illness. —The captain, mate and steward of the ship Antoinette whose examination for alleged cruelty to sailors has caused considerable interest in St. John were on Saturday committed for trial. —William Larter, acquitted last August at Charlottetown on the charge of causing the death of the McEachern girl, will be tried again next week on a new charge of procuring drugs to procure abortion. —The Chatham World says:—"The smelt supremacy seems to have passed from the Miramichi. While the catch is light here this year, other places that caught none two or three years ago, are making big hauls. —It is estimated that from one bushel of corn four gallons of whiskey can be made which retails at \$16 by the glass. —During the last week of the old year the smelt fishing was a success between Campbellton and Dalhousie Junction. Some 150 nets are in the bay and \$7,000 cash was paid for the week's fishing, the smelt realizing the fisherman two and a half cents per pound on the ice. The first week of the new year is not expected to be so good, as the tides are taking off and are not suitable, but good fishing is expected about the 8th of the month. Already five or six carloads have been shipped. We hear dealers complaining that they have to pay over \$300 per car in freight and duty before the railway will take charge of the fish. It would be quite a help to local dealers if the railway would make arrangements to have the duty and freight paid on delivery at destination.—Campbellton Enterprise.
