SMELTS.—The catch of smelts during the past week has been small. The fishing up the river has practically ended and the tides further down have been unfavorable. The price has fallen from 3 1/2 cents to 2 1/2 cents per pound.

CAPTAIN STEWART FINED.—At the Liverpool Police Court on Friday, Dec. 15, Robert Stewart, captain of the Bessie Markham, of New Brunswick, was charged with wilfully neglecting to exhibit lights on the barque while at sea, as required by the Board of Trade regulations. Whilst on a passage from New Brunswick, defendant failed to exhibit lights, except when steamers, etc., passed them, which was a most dangerous practice. Edward Phinney deposed that he was on watch on the barque on the night of the 17th of Nov. and lights were not exhibited from 8 to 12 o'clock. They should have been exhibited from sunset to sunrise. On the 22nd no lights were put out except when a steamer was passing. He made a log of it at the time, which he produced. Other evidence having been given for defence, it was stated that a sufficient amount of oil was put in the tank before the passage was commenced, but on the passage the tap was allowed to remain on after some oil had been drawn and a large quantity of oil ran to waste. The second mate, named Frazer, was called in support of this, and said that before leaving New Brunswick he placed about thirty gallons of oil in the tank. The bench considered the quantity of oil must have been too little, and that sufficient precautions had not been used by the captain as to getting in the ship's stores, and inflicted a fine of £5 and £3 costs in the first case, the second being withdrawn by the prosecution.—Liverpool Shipping Telegraph.

—Dr. Andrew Archer, author of Archer's Canadian History died suddenly at St. John, Saturday morning. The night before he attended the artillery ball in the Mechanics' Institute. While there he became suddenly ill, complaining of a pain in the chest. He walked to his boarding house, Mrs. Gillespie's, on Chipman Hill, and asked for a mustard plaster. When the attendance came Dr. Archer was dead.

—The Campbellton Enterprise says:— Smelt fishing is reported good this week, large catches being on record. As much as \$500 a day is being paid out at Dalhousie Junction, the price at present being 2 1/2 cents per pound, which is all the American market will stand as they are selling in Boston 5 to 5 1/2 cents per pound. The dealers who are the principal buyers are Messrs. McGregor, J. P. Mowat, Reid and Mawhinney and A. and R. Loggie.

—A Campbellton Enterprise correspondent writing from Grand River says: A sad accident happened here on Tuesday last which cast a gloom over the place. One, Young Morian left his home in the early morn in the full vigor of life, and was brought back before noon a corpse. It appears that he went to the mill to get grain crushed and whilst amongst the machinery, was caught by a wheel and instantly killed, his head being crushed and arms broken and lacerated.

—On the night of December 20th the cash drawer at Red Pine Station, on the I. C. R., was forced open and a twenty dollar bill was stolen. The matter was placed in Mr. Skeffington's hands and Wednesday a man named Joseph Young, 20 years of age, of Big River, Bathurst, was arrested on suspicion. Young was brought before Stipendiary Magistrate MacLauchlan yesterday morning. Evidence was given that the accused had purchased a pair of boots, rubbers and a silk handkerchief for a young lady and a suit of clothing for himself, the detective tracing the purchase of these articles with the stolen money. Mr. Skeffington, who is considerable of a lawyer, prosecuted the case on behalf of the I. C. R. Mr. Landry defended. The prisoner was committed for trial.

—Fairville, St. John, was shocked Friday over the report that Rev. C. H. Price, a Probationer of the Methodist church and stationed at Grand Manan, had committed suicide at the residence of Hon. Senator Lewin. The reverend gentleman arrived there on Monday, and intended to remain until after the holidays. On the passage up from Grand Manan he was very sea sick and the illness had very much weakened his nervous system. About noon, the gentleman entered the bath room and about half an hour later a noise was heard. The family rushed to the room, but found the door secured and fastened from the inside. The door was broken open. Mr. Price was discovered lying dead upon the floor with a revolver lying by his side. He shot himself and died almost instantly. The deceased's father Rev. S. B. Price is stationed at Cornwall, P. E. I.
