WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION COLUMN.

The Importance of Temperance Teaching in the Sunday School.
(Continued)

Here is your starting point, dear friends: begin by teaching scholars that there is danger in drinking cider. If you don't believe it, and I fear some of you don't, just get some of our leaflets on cider, and if you are open to conviction, I'm sure you will be speedily convinced that danger lies in that apparently innocent drink. I do not know that your unbelief will excuse you any when you come to stand before the Master, and he asks, "Where is thy faith?"

Why do we emphasize the need of this work being done in Sunday Schools? For many reasons. I'll only give one or two. There is a strange, perverse dislike on the part of many to joining our temperance societies. Even among those who profess and call themselves Christians we find it, and it even extends so far that they object to having their children join our Bands of Hope. Take the work into the Sunday School and there is no objection. Then, once a week the children can be reached and words of loving admonition and counsel given. In many of the smaller districts, there is no regular temperance society, and if this work is not done in the Sunday school it remains undone.

In the Sunday School libraries good work may be done. The goody-goody book has given way to a trashy style, that to my mind accounts largely for the almost universal appetite for unhealthy fiction. There are many pure good stories written, inculcating temperance principles if you will only take time to select them. What will your temperance lesson amount to, if you send the child home with a book where the people are pictured in their elegant dining room, sipping wine from crystal glasses. Children receive their impressions from books as well as words.

There is nothing that hinders the coming of our blessed Lord's Kingdom as the liquor traffic. A missionary said recently, "You may at well stop sending out missionaries if you cannot cut off the supply of rum." Within a few weeks a valued life has been cut off in its prime. Rev. N. B. Thornton wrote from Alaska: "The natives are peaceable enough when not drunk: when intoxicated they are very dangerous, and it is largely owing to this cause that so many missionaries have been murdered. In less than a week after writing he was shot by drunken natives. No need to speak of poor rum-cursed Africa crying out to the Christian world for deliverance. I do not see how any teacher can mention the missionary cause without telling their scholars of the terrible traffic that is carried on by wicked men.

Bishop Simpson, of the American Methodist Church, says, "If every male member of the Methodist Church would go to the polls, and there for one day do his duty, the liquor traffic would receive its death blow." The Christian at Work says, "The liquor traffic exists to-day by the influence of the Christian churches. They are masters of the situation, so far as the traffic is concerned. When they say go, and eat go, it will go." It is our duty as Sunday School teachers to train our boys—yes, and our girls too—that when they come to vote they will vote as they pray.

I came across some verses not long ago that I will repeat to you.
"It was late in November and chill was the weather;
Two ballots were cast in a box together,
Two ballots in one box together;
They nestled up close like brother to brother,
