### A Mine Horror.

HALIFAX, Dec 29.—Hezekiah Loois, Michael Savage, William Turpel and Angus Faulkner, were drowned in the Symonds Kaye gold mine at Montague, TERIAN CHURCH .- Mr. A. W. K. The gang working at the east end of this tunnel fired off a blast. There was supposed to be a distance of fifty feet between this tunnel and an old working, but it stead of fifty there was only five feet of wall. The blast drove a hole through this thin partition, through which water from the old workings rushed with great velocity. Kenneth Miller, Edward Pace, Wm. Pace, and George Grant, who were in the western end of the tunnel, escaped, but the others were like drowned rats in trap. There was no possible escape for them. In a short time there was over forty feet of water in the shaft. Later reports from the mines are to the effect that the drowning was due to the grossest carelessness.

The tunnel was known to be dangerous. Old miners would not work in it. The managing director, Alfred Wodehouse, is a stranger to the district. He has no plans of the workings but was working toward an old tunnel full of water, supposing it to be fifty feet distant. It was only five feet distant. The underground manager of the mine was a hotel waiter a few months ago and had no mining experience. The victims of the disaster were young fellows two of whom had only been working in the mine a few days. Last night the underground manager is said to have been warned that he was in dangerous proximity






