THE QUINN INQUIRY.

Those who have followed the proceed-
ings in the Quinn inquiry, will be reminded
of the story of a trial held in his satanic
majesty's dominions. The opposition had
good reason to feel dissatisfied with the
manner in which the Leary investigation
was conducted, but the proceedings in
present inquiry are even more farcical.
It will be observed that in this case Mr.
Blair has drawn up his own indictment,
and in doing so he has left the committee
very little scope for investigation, even if
a majority of that body were disposed to
get at the bottom of the facts. The
resolutions are carefully drawn so as to
shut out any evidence that does not
directly or personally implicate the At-
torney General. It will be remembered
that Mr. Pitts did not charge Mr. Blair
with having been directly implicated in
the Quinn transaction. On the contrary,
he stated that the Attorney General was
far too shrewd to have any direct con-
nection with the matter, but if Mr. Quinn's
statements can be believed, there can be
no doubt but that Mr. Blair was fully
cognizant of the negotiations between
Messrs. Wilson, Barry and Quinn. Mr.
Quinn's evidence before the committee
fully corroborates his statutory declaration
and in addition to the documents referred
to therein, he produced before the com-
mittee another interesting letter which
reads as follows:—

FREDERICTON, Nov. 19, 1890.

Dear Mr. Quinn,—I have been away to
Southampton for two days. I will see
Blair this morning and see you to-day sure.

case, while Mr. Quinn was denied the
privilege of Counsel. Questions which

were objected to by Mr. Blair and ruled
out by his committee. Here are a few of
