OTTAWA, April 5.—In the House this afternoon Mr. Davies was told that Charles C. Carlyle was employed as an immigration agent in Newfoundland.

Mr. Mills of Bothwell then resumed the budget debate and continued speaking up to recess and for half an hour thereafter.

He was replied to by Mr. Bennett of East Simcoe.

Col. O'Brien followed in a short speech in which he announced his intention of voting for Cartwright's amendment. This is taken to mean that both he and McCarthy intend henceforth to act with the liberal party.

Mr. Craig followed in support of the Government.

Mr. Dawson, of Addington followed, speaking up to the adjournment. Mr. Davies moved the adjournment of the debate.

Mrs. Pearson who has been visiting her sister, returned to Moncton Wednesday. Miss Wetmore accompanied her to Penobscot.

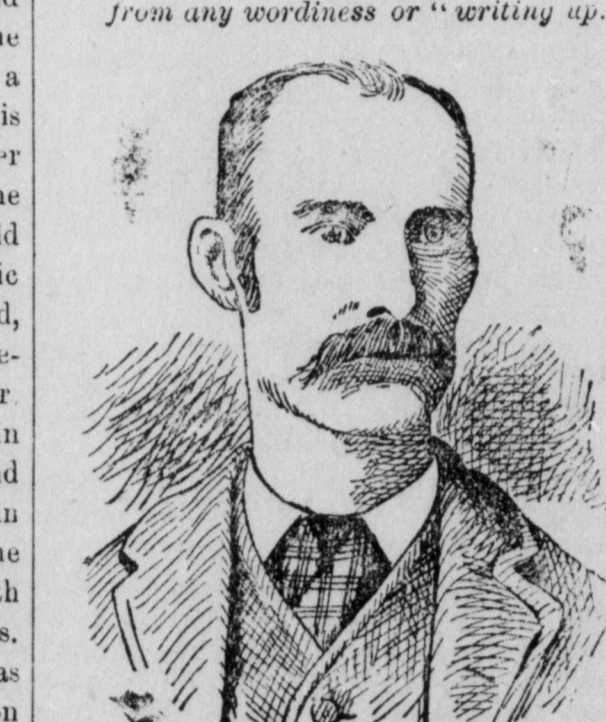
Mr. King has returned from Richibucto. P. E. Gallant left for Chatham on a business trip.
