MR. McNERNEY'S SPEECH

In The Tariff Debate.

have to-day, was in favour of the United States to the extent of \$74,830,221.

Mr. Charlton—That is wrong. Mr. McNERNEY—If it would not weary the House, I would read the figures. I will, at all events, read part of the speech delivered by Mr. Butterworth. In that speech there is one small error, because for 1864 Mr. Butterworth makes the imports from British North America provinces \$27,000,000, odd, and it is printed \$7,952,401. That is evidently a mistake, because they never fell in value below \$20,000,000 in any year from 1854 to 1866 and they could not have possibly been only \$7,000,000 odd. What did Mr. Butterworth say? In the course of his speech he said:

Now my friend and colleague was not accurate in his information touching the history of the legislation, the purpose of which was to establish reciprocal trade between United States and Canada, and his figures therefore are misleading and convey to this committee and the country an utterly erroneous impression touching the result of the commerce between United States and the provinces of Canada under the Reciprocity Treaty, 1854-1865. The impression conveyed to the Committee and the country was that the balance of trade was against us.

We are also pleased to see Robert F. Stothart of Newcastle, who is boss at Spruce Point. Robt. is looking considerably the worse of his struggle with la grippe, but we hope when the busy season comes on Robert will be O. K. This factory is adding three new boats to those it operated last season.

Mr. Andrew Goinett, and Moses Dugas, at Eel River, are adding a new boat, which will make four boats. This factory has been most successful in past seasons having always had a record of about 125 boxes to

We think if Messrs Richard O'Leary, Manager Stothart secured the co operation of Councillor Daigle these desirable changes could be obtained, and while writing on this score let me draw the attention of our M. P. at Ottawa to the promised light house at the Bataure.

We are pleased to notice that Capt. John Gallant is prepared for the herring fishing, which he says will make their first appearance early this month. He has built two boats during the past winter and if not disposed of will be manned by Jimmy and Victoria. We are inclined to think that the old tar, with first mate Jimmy and boatswain Victoria, will capture a large quantity of the finny tribe.


