NEW BRUNSWICK.

Lord Aberdeen left Ottawa last week for a few days salmon fishing on the Restigouche.

Mr. Alexander Gibson announces that the proposed Stanley-Cross Creek branch of the Canada Eastern Railway will be constructed and trains in operation within a year, the subsidy asked for having been granted by the Dominion Government.

Mr. W. C. Milner of Sackville, was in St. John last Friday, in the interests of the Chignecto Marine Railway.

Melbourne Dryden, a laborer employed carrying slates to the roof of the Presbyterian church building, Moncton, fell from a staging yesterday afternoon to the floor on the interior of the building.

Two lads aged 15 and 17, cousins, sons of Charles T. and Mark LeBlanc, were drowned in Bourque's mill pond at Fox Creek, near Moncton last week.

The Presbyterian church at Shediac was totally destroyed by fire last Friday evening about eight o'clock.

James H. Crockett, the editor of the Fredericton Gleaser, has been arrested on the charge of publishing a criminal libel in his paper of Tuesday last against John S. Leighton, the registrar of wills and deeds for Carleton county.

NOVA SCOTIA.

General Booth will land in Halifax in September for a six months' stay in America.

A rather serious accident happened on the Windsor & Annapolis Railway last week. The fast express known as the "Flying Bluenose" collided with the train carrying the annual cherry excursion.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

An organizer of the Patrons of Industry the new farmer's association, which has been making its influence felt in Ontario and the Northwest, has been sent to Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia.

QUEBEC.

A disastrous fire occurred at Montreal last Wednesday. The damage will amount to \$100,000.

The county of Chicoutimi and Saguenay by a large majority has decided to repeal the Scott Act. The Act was adopted in 1885 by a vote of 1187 to 529.

J. H. Booth, commission merchant, of Montreal, was found yesterday morning insensible on the floor of his office in Ottawa.

The jury of doctors selected by Coroner McMahon of Montreal, to enquire into the death of Frank Upton, who it was supposed had died from the effects of impure vaccine, have decided that the vaccine employed in the case was of the most perfect quality.

ONTARIO.

Adolphus Martin, a French farmer of Maidstone has been arrested for cutting out the eyes of hogs to stop their deprivations.

It looks as if the independence of the Patrons of Industry might be something more than a name.

The body of the late Patrick Purcell M. P., which was stolen some three years ago from the family cemetery near Cornwall has been found in the St. Lawrence river just below Hopkins Point.

An Ottawa despatch says: A remarkable thing occurred on the farm of a Mr. Cousineau, in a village near the outskirts the other day.

The trial of Rev. R. C. Horner on the charge of not taking the station assigned to him by conference and of conducting meetings within the jurisdiction of other ministers without consulting or obtaining their permission to do so, was held in the Methodist church Pembroke Tuesday.

The Winnipeg exhibition proved a great success. The attendance was much larger than was anticipated.

MANITOBA.

The Prohibition League opened a convention last week. On Monday a union of the two different branches was affected.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The Cariboo Stage was robbed recently by a young man named Henry Brown.

The trouble in regard to wages hitherto arising between the miners of this district and the management of the colliery which threatened to close down the mines throwing out of employment 1500 men, has been settled by the miners agreeing to work under the existing rates until the end of the year.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

Judgment in the Trinity (Nfld.) case was delivered last Wednesday.

Encounters are reported to have occurred between the Newfoundland and French fishermen on the French shore of Newfoundland, concerning the catching of lobsters.

The Newfoundlanders claim that as lobsters are not fish in the proper sense that France has no right to erect lobster factories on the French shore, so-called, where, by treaty rights, French fishermen are allowed to cure their fish.

A case of genuine asiatic cholera has been discovered in Oxville, Ill.

It is reported that Col. Beckenridge the fallen "star of Kentucky" has been expelled from the Masonic Order.

Striking miners are causing trouble in Pennsylvania. At Glen Camp a battle took place between the strikers and deputies in which one of the latter was wounded.

Merchant E. Perry, a sixteen-year-old anarchist of Fort Wayne, Ind, has been arrested for threatening to blow up the largest building in the city.

The Arctic expedition under the command of Walter Wellman, a Washington journalist which was reported lost has been spoken by a Norwegian sealing vessel.

Reports from Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, Wisconsin, Nebraska and Kansas show that the heat last week was the greatest for years.

A new labor union has been organized which, its leaders say, will gather under one banner the whole army of the toiling masses.

The Kreuz Zeitung of Berlin, states that the engagement of the Czarewitch to Princess Alix of Hesse is broken.

The American steamer City of Peking, which went ashore in Vendo Bay, Japan, has been floated. She sustained no damage.

Hundreds of the Mahdists are surrendering to the Italians. They report many of their comrades starving in the Atbarra marshes.

The Novoe Vremya of St. Petersburg, says Russia cannot remain indifferent to the fate of Corea and ought to side with China against Japan or else localize the war.

M. Arnaut, a Bulgarian civil servant has confessed the murder of M. Beltschiff, the Bulgarian minister, killed while walking with the then Premier Stambouloff, and has been arrested.

FOREIGN.

The German Government has finally decided not to accept Herr Dowe's so-called bullet proof cuirass for use in the German army.

The difficulties between China and Japan, arising out of the Korean question have culminated in a declaration of war between these two powers.

Baron Molten, formerly Russian Consul at Koenigsberg, has been expelled from Germany for secretly inspecting the fort works at Pillau, on which occasion he was accompanied by a Russian admiral.

Wonders will never cease! Deputy Clemenceau was actually wounded in a political dual with deputy Deschanel last week. This is carrying a harmless amusement too far.

Theodore Joseph Constance Meunier the Anarchist, who was recently extradited from England, was at Paris yesterday condemned to life imprisonment.

The bandits and smugglers in Chiapas, along the Guatemalan frontier of Mexico, have become so bold and troublesome that the coffee planters and peaceable settlers have appealed to President Diaz, to send a large force of troops to protect them.

Owing to the hay famine last year in Switzerland all surplus stock was killed, and now there is a great scarcity.

Commander Baron Dhanis, of the Belgian troops in the Congo State, has reported that two Arabs have been found guilty by court-martial of having murdered Emin Pasha.

The crew of the British barque Constantine, Captain Edgett, bound from Dunkirk, for New York, have mutinied and are confined in the fore-castle of the vessel.

The budget bill has passed its second reading in the House of Lords without division. What will become of all the prophecies which were founded on the supposition that Salisbury would call on his followers to defeat it?

Word has been received at San Francisco of the total wreck of the British barque Wm. LeLacheur off Provost Island, 600 miles from Singapore.

Speaking at a meeting of the London branch of the Imperial Federation League, last Thursday, Col. Denison, of Toronto, said that the greatest enmity was felt in the United States towards England.

It appears that some twelve or more persons were implicated in the plot. Their plans were, however, made known to the President, who took prompt measures and arrested the conspirators.
