—Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Chief Commissioner of Public Works, was in Richibucto last week, on his way home from Northumberland County. On Thursday he engaged the steamer, Victor, and in company with a party of friends proceeded up the river to inspect the Main River bridge. We do not know what conclusion Mr. Emmerson arrived at in connection with this bridge, but it is to be hoped he will take some steps to put it in a safe condition for teams. Its dangerous condition has been more than once pointed out to the Chief Commissioner and a resolution was passed at the County Council board calling his attention to it, but so far no notice has been taken of these complaints. Personal inspection has no doubt convinced Mr. Emmerson that repairs are very much needed.

—Crowded houses have been the rule during the week's engagement of the Wallace Hopper Co. The plays have all been good, and though some of them had been given here before, the public seemed to enjoy the old favorites quite as well as the new. On Tuesday night "Little Fret" was given; on Wednesday "Nugget Mel;" on Thursday "Ten nights in a Bar-Room;" on Friday "Reclaimed;" and on Saturday, the closing night, "The Little Duchess." In addition, a matinee was given on Saturday afternoon, when "Little Fret" was repeated. Miss Robinson the leading lady, is always a favorite in Windsor, and her rendition of the parts assigned was first class in all respects. Mr. Hopper is a host in himself, and the support by the rest of the company is good. A special feature was the generous presents made at each entertainment. Several gold and silver watches, a ton of coal, a barrel of flour and a great many smaller articles of greater or less value were given away during the week, the presentations being conducted with the utmost fairness. The company left on Monday for the western part of the Province. —Hants Journal.

—The body of Herbert Stewart, the young first mate of the schooner Walter Sumner, an account of whose death by drowning has already been given was washed ashore at O'Leary's wharf last Wednesday, where it was found by Mr. Len Hains. A jury consisting of Wm. Wheten, D. Richard, J. F. Atkinson, Robert Cochrane, Keady O'Leary, Robert Beers and Wm. Hudson was impelled by coroner Bourque to inquire into the circumstances connected with the accident. After the usual quantity of red-tape had been furnished the jury returned a verdict of accidental drowning. The evidence given was somewhat contradictory. Tower, the steward of the vessel declared that he considered deceased under the influence of liquor and incapable of taking care of himself, while Capt. Caleb Reid swore that when Stewart went aboard the schooner he walked as straight as he could himself. Chas. Goodwin who, along with Wm. Harnett, went ashore with deceased testified to taking one drink with him in the evening and another just before they went aboard the schooner. Whether or not Stewart had been drinking in the interval he was not prepared to say. It appears, however, that the young man was only able to stand a very small quantity of liquor. After going aboard Stewart was seen leaning over the rail vomiting for fifteen or twenty minutes. He then lay down on the hatches along with Goodwin, as it was cooler there than in the cabin, and the latter says, went to sleep almost immediately. Goodwin is unable to say at what time deceased fell overboard. When he himself went to sleep Stewart was snoring heavily and it was not till four o'clock next morning that anyone noticed his disappearance. From all accounts it seems certain that the unfortunate young man must have got up to the chains and by some means lost his footing and fell into the water. Five dollars and forty-seven cents was found in his pocket and he had twelve dollars to his credit on the ship's books. The body was interred Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock, Rev Mr. Allen officiating.

The deceased was one of the charter members of the first mas nite lodge ever established in Moncton, and is probably the only survivor of the original members of Keith lodge. He could tell many interesting stories of life in this province 40 and 50 years ago and was universally respected by a wide circle of friends and acquaintances. Deceased leaves a widow and six sons and two daughters living, viz., Samuel Allanach, of Buctouche, Robert Allanach of Kouchibouguac, John T. Allanach of Moncton, Mrs. John McKee of McKee's Mills, Kent county, Mary Allanach and William Allanach of Newport, R. I., and Alex. Allanach and Edward Allanach of Pennsylvania.
