**SUGGESTS.**  
—Mention was made a few weeks ago of the death of yellow fever at Rio Janeiro of Capt. Wm. J. Livingston, son of Mrs. Livingston, of Kingston. Capt. Livingston was master of the Bark Kelvin and his wife and two children were on board with him. A report that Mrs. Livingston had also died of the same disease is believed to be incorrect as news has been received of her safe arrival at Liverpool.

—Jack Peters, an Indian, was sent to jail, Monday, for being drunk. He was taken before a magistrate and gave information as to where he had procured his liquor. A fine was imposed and allowed to stand against him as a guarantee of future good conduct. The magistrate imposed a fine of \$200 or three months in jail on any one convicted of selling or supplying an Indian with liquor and an effort will be made to enforce the law in this respect.

—The "Saturday Night," a new weekly to be published at Halifax, will make its appearance about the end of May. Its special field will be the Maritime Provinces and its endeavors in the interest of Maritime Provincialists. A thoroughly wide awake journal, its departments filled with information on subjects in which every one is interested, its columns open to fair discussion of public affairs. "Saturday Night" should receive the support and encouragement of the people.

—Mrs. Thomas Dickinson died at her home in Kingston, last Saturday. She had been attending her mother, the late Mrs. Martin, who is in poor health, and thereby contracted a severe cold which developed into pneumonia. She leaves behind a husband and nine children, some of whom are very young. She was 48 years of age. The funeral, Tuesday, was one of the largest ever seen around here. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family.

—A farmer in Kouchibouguac, whose name need not be given, became so interested in his farming operations that he neglected to keep the run of the days of the week. Last Sunday he was up with the lark and did a good day's work until four o'clock in the afternoon, when one of his neighbors kindly informed him that he was breaking the fourth commandment. Work was suspended and the farmer has taken the pains to provide himself with an almanac to guard against such mistakes in future.

—The death of Mr. Wm. Bowser, one of the oldest and most respected inhabitants of Kingston, took place Monday morning. Mr. Bowser had been in poor health for some time and his death was not unexpected. He leaves surviving him a wife and five children: Dr. J. C. Bowser of Sackville, Frank Bowser, customs official, and Wm. J. Bowser, barrister, of Vancouver, B. C., and Edwin Bowser and Minnie Bowser of Kingston. He was a prominent member of Lodge St. Andrews F. & M., and will be buried to-day (Wednesday), at 3 o'clock with Masonic honors.

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The train has commenced making its regular trips this week.

Manager Evans of the B. & M. Ry., was in town last week.

MAY 21.—Capt. Peter Smith returned last night from a successful fishing trip to Neguac, Northumberland Co. He secured over 300 barrels of herring.

The lobster fishing season did not open in earnest until about Thursday last. The water was too rough in the early part of the week to enable the fishermen to overhaul the traps.

Mr. Peter King's new saw mill, near the railway bridge, is nearly ready for sawing. A wharf is being built to enable the loading of vessels in front of the mill. It will be the first time in many years that vessels have been loaded above the highway bridge.

Mr. James D. Irving, of Buctouche, has started a freight service by water between that place and Point du Chene, in competition with the Buctouche & Moncton Railway. Their schooner, The Minnow, has made a couple of trips over the route and carried considerable quantities of freight. This is a return to the old system which prevailed before the construction of the railway.

A family named LeBlanc, living in the old Ryan house, about half way between Buctouche and Little River, had an experience one night last week that they are not likely to forget. Two of their children, a girl of about eleven, and a boy of five years of age, were sent, late in the afternoon, to feed the cows. The herd had strayed into the woods and the children went in search of them. Up to the time darkness set in their search had not been successful and they started to return home. The little ones were familiar with every pathway of the woods in the daytime but lost their bearings in the darkness. It is supposed that they followed a path which took them directly away from instead of towards their home.

Their non-appearance at home caused a great deal of uneasiness and the children's father and several of the neighbors formed themselves into a searching party. They ranged the woods for a great part of the night, finding no trace of the children and receiving no response to their shouts.

To the great joy of the family, the missing ones walked into the house at about nine o'clock in the morning, their eyes red from weeping and their clothing torn from contact with the bushes. They had wandered nearly all night through the woods in the hope of finding a way out. When thoroughly tired out they had thrown themselves on the cold, damp earth, under the shelter of a tree and slept for several hours. Fortunately both are strong and hardy and did not suffer any ill effects from their trying experience.
