## A Farmer's Son Tortured

CONFINED TO THE HOUSE FOR MONTHS AND UNABLE TO WALK.

A Sensational Story From the Neighborhood of Cooksville. The Father Tells How His Son Obtained Release—What a Prominent Toronto Druggist Says.

Four miles from the village of Cooksville, which is 15 miles west of Toronto on the Credit Valley division of the C. P. R., on what is known as the "Centre Road" is the farm of Thomas O'Neil. 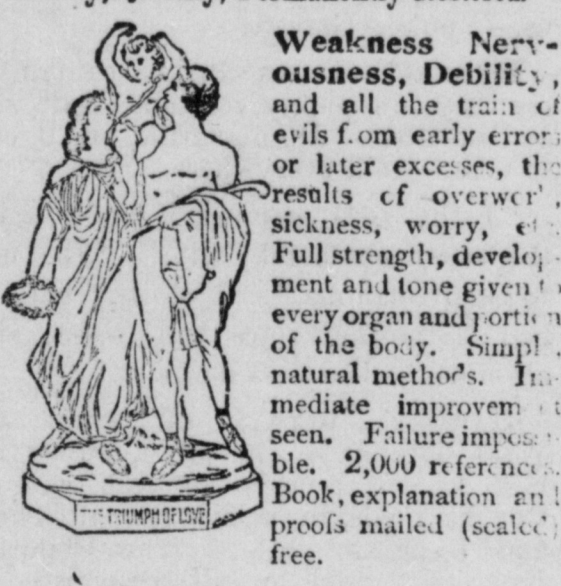

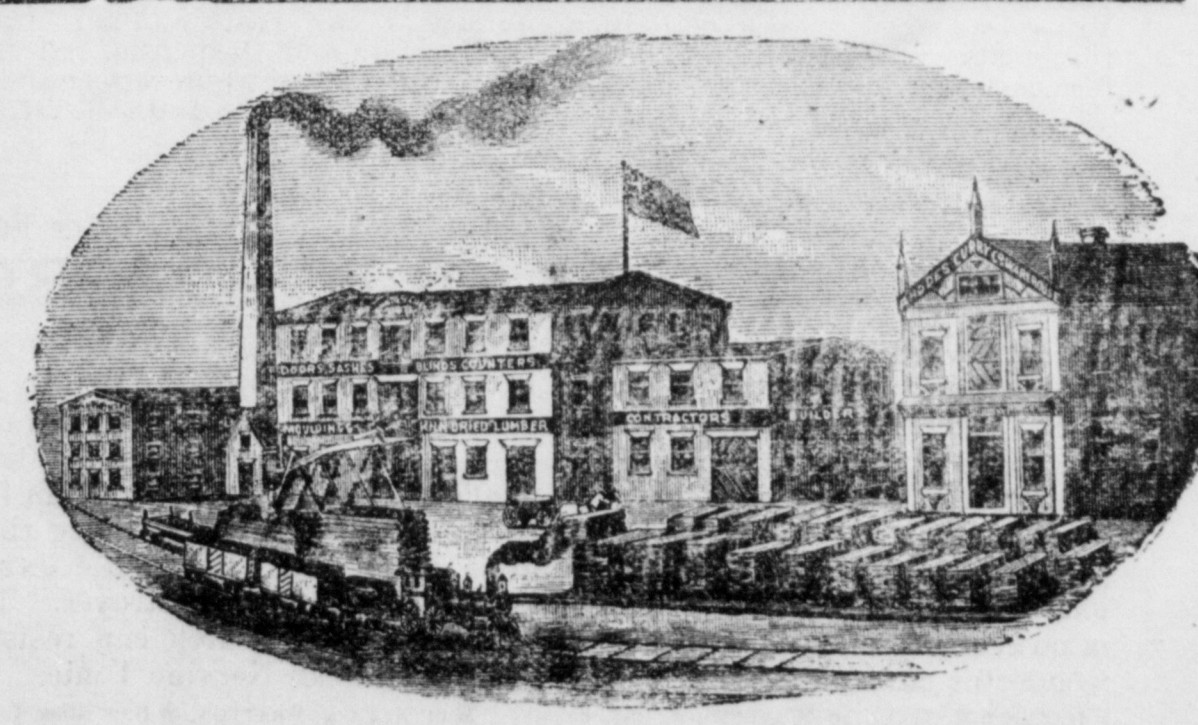
