"Isawood" also traces to the "Messengers," her dam "Jen," being by "Young Buchanan," 9598, 2,293, second dam by "Matchless," a thoroughbred with 2 in the list, third dam, by the sire of "Belle Strickland" by the "Withered horse" by "Winthrop Messenger."
