But, some three fathoms from this point of the meeting waters, and beneath it, just where the curve is deepest, a single crag, as large as a drinking-table and no larger, juts through the foam, and, if a man could reach it, he might leap from it some twelve fathoms, sheer into the spray-hidden pit beneath, there to sink or swim as it might befall. This crag is called Wolf's Fang.

Always have some of your best pieces well in hand, so you can do yourself and teach full justice when asked to play.

Always have a good light on your music page when reading music.

Taking off Gloves.

As there is a right way and many wrong ways to put on gloves, there is also a right way to take them off. They should never be drawn off by the finger tips, unless they are old and very loose. Taking them off in that way soon stretches the ends of the fingers so that they can never afterwards be made to give a pleasing fit. Instead, take the glove by the wrist, and draw it gently back over the hand till the second joint of the finger is reached. It can then be drawn off by the finger tips without damage. When it is thus taken off the best way to treat it is to leave the fingers distended, just as they came from the hand; when it is next wanted, it will fit the hand much more easily, and look better than if it were smoothed and flattened back into the form of a new glove.—
