FIRED INTO THE CROWD.

One or two men are said to have been hit, but it is not known how seriously they were hurt. A dozen shots or so were fired. In the meantime the engineer had reversed his engine and the train was soon forced backward out of reach of the now unbridled mob and returned to the city. This is the first shooting in the present strike. It occurred in a locality wher. the men were already furious, and is believed will be signal for desperate encounters very soon. It was reported from the general Managers' Association at 5 o'clock, that the police began firing upon the strikers at the Fourth street withdrawal of the special train on the Lake Shore road. The crowd increased to great proportions and drove the police back toward the city. The latter fired upon their pursuers as they retreated, the crowd increasing at every crossing. The mob was said to be moving toward the city over the Western Indiana tracks, and was overturning signal towers and switchmen's shanties, setting fire to them and wrecking cars and other property. The Union Stock yards switching company tracks were blockaded by strikers during the early evening, and at six o'clock 2,000 men started foa the clty on a riotous demonstration, but were scattered by the police. After personal inspection of the scenes of violence, May or Hopkins for half an hour was closeted with Corporation Counsel Rubens. At the expiration of the interview, a letter was despatched to Chief of Police Brennan, and the following proclamation was issued: "The event of the last few hours render it necessary that extraordinary measures be taken to preserve peace and order." UNION STOCK YARDS, Chicago, July 6. -[Special].-At daylight this morning there was evidenc of violence all along the stock yards. All night long scattered mobs continued their riotous work.
