THE ALMS HOUSE QUESTION.

Before the last meeting of the Council it was understood that a resolution would be brought forward favoring the erection of an almshouse for the county on failing that then that steps would be taken by the English parishes of the county to provide for the erection and maintenance of a suitable place to keep and provide for those who become a public charge. For some reason known best to themselves, the Acadians of this county have always set their faces against any change in the present barbarous system of selling out paupers to the lowest bidders, and when the matter was brought up in the Council by Councillor Murphy, the two St. Louis Councillors, Messrs. Richard and Johnson, declared that they had been instructed by the electors of their parish not only to vote against the proposal to erect a county almshouse, but to do all in their power to prevent the erection of such an institution by any one or more parishes. Councillor Johnson went even further and declared that he was pledged not only to vote against the proposition, but if possible to prevent any discussion in the matter. We can understand that there may be reasons why the people of St. Louis should object to change the present system of supporting the poor in their own parish, but why they should interfere when other parishes propose to adopt a new method, is something which is difficult for a reasonable person to understand. The vote for the poor in the parish of Richibucto for the present year was \$2,000, an increase of \$200 over the amount voted last year. This is a pretty large amount, and there is every prospect that it will increase rather than decrease from year to year. The sum of \$600 was assessed on the parish of Weldford for the same purpose. The people of these parishes naturally desire to reduce the expenditure in this direction and are therefore desirous that steps be taken to provide for an almshouse. If the other parishes of the county wish to join these parishes in the undertaking, so much the better. If, however, they do not desire to change their present method of maintaining the poor, then they are free to continue it. All that the people of Richibucto and Weldford ask is to be allowed to look after themselves and their own poor. They do not wish to interfere with St. Louis and they see no reason why the people of St. Louis should object or wish to prevent other parishes from acting in this matter as they think best. The information furnished Warden Wathen by Mr. Stewart of Northumberland, shows that the cost of maintaining paupers in the county of Northumberland has been greatly lessened since the erection of the Alms House there. The whole amount assessed this year in the County of Northumberland for the support of the poor is only \$15 00. Other counties which have abandoned the old system of selling paupers at public auction and substituted the poor house in its place, appear to be pretty well satisfied with the change. The assessment for the support of the poor in the several parishes of the county for the present year is as follows:—

Table listing almshouse costs by parish: Acadiaville (\$40.00), Carleton (140.00), St. Louis (300.00), Richibucto (1000.00), Harcourt (40.00), Weldford (600.00), Wellington (500.00), St. Mary (468.00), St. Paul (205.00), Dundas (200.00). Total: 3593.00.

This amount would be amply sufficient to erect a workhouse and maintain it for the year and the amount required next year would not probably be half as large. The great majority of those who need public assistance, are able to earn their own living if work suited to their capacity is furnished them. As inmates of a poor house, under the supervision of an overseer, they could be furnished with such employment and thus enabled to contribute largely to their own support. We trust that the matter will not drop but that at next session of the Council steps will be taken, if not by all the parishes at least by the English parishes, to provide and equip an institution of this kind for the support of their own poor.

OTHER MUNICIPALITIES HEARD FROM.

Last summer, when the Kent County Council passed resolutions censuring the Blair government for its recent legislation, imposing new and unjust burdens on the municipalities, the Moncton Transcript declared that the Kent County Councillors

were a body of ignorant men who were under the political management of Mr. Phinney. It further declared that the Councillors did not understand what they were talking about, and that the tendency of the legislation complained of was to lighten rather than to increase existing burdens. Six months have passed, and the legislation complained of is beginning to bear fruit. A general howl from all over the province has gone forth, concerning the expense thrown on the municipalities by the Act of last session dealing with the cost of maintaining the pauper insane. The Municipal Councils of York, St. John and Carleton have passed resolutions protesting against these new provincial exactions, and the County Council of Charlotte has now before it a resolution which recites the grievances complained of, and most emphatically protests against "all such objectionable legislation."

Under the Act of last winter, York County has been called upon to pay \$3000 for the maintenance of its pauper insane. Northumberland contributes \$2500, St. John, \$6000 and Westmorland about \$3000. The amount taxed against the other counties, (including Kent) has not yet been given to the public, but no doubt we will be called upon to pay our share. When it is remembered that the entire cost of maintaining the provincial Lunatic Asylum was formerly borne by the province, it will give some idea of the rate at which provincial charges are being unloaded upon the municipalities. The St. John Globe, Liberal, and formerly a strong supporter of Mr Blair, has the following to say:—

"It has already been stated in the Globe that under a government act passed by the Local Legislature last session, the cost of maintaining the pauper insane will be thrown on the municipalities. What this means was learned to-day, when the city received notice that it is called on to pay for the support of 77 insane persons whose legal residence was in this city, and the county received notice that it is to pay for the support of 16 insane persons. At \$1.25 per week for each person this means that the city must contribute (on the basis of the number of pauper insane now in the institution) \$5,005 a year, and that the county must pay \$1,040. The law came into force on the 1st of January.

This law will probably add two or three thousand dollars a year to the county taxes in Westmorland, already heavy enough. But apparently the county council led by Mr. Emmerson's brother-in-law, Mr. Atkinson, will still think that it is unnecessary to protest against such legislation by the Blair government.
