

LOCAL NEWS.

JURY FEES.—The Jurors who attended the October term of the County Court did not receive their fees on account of the absence of the Judge. Friday, Judge Wells made an order allowing them their regular mileage and fees.

HORSE RAN AWAY.—While Mrs. D. D. Warman and Miss Warman, of Molus River, were out driving one day last week, their horse took fright and ran away. The sleigh was broken into pieces but happily the ladies escaped unhurt.

A DRIVE TO BUCTOUCHE.—A number from Kingston and Richibucto intend driving to Buctouche, this (Wednesday) evening and partaking of an oyster supper at the Bay View Hotel. Professor Goldie is to be in attendance, and no doubt a pleasant time will be spent.

A CORRECTION.—In the report of the proceedings of the Kent County Council last week the remarks credited to Coun. Atkinson re the running at large of pigs in the parish of Dundas were not made by that gentleman. Councillor Atkinson made no remarks in the matter.

HORSE NEARLY DROWNED.—A horse belonging to a smelt fisherman broke through the ice near Beattie's Creek, last Friday night about midnight. The driver tried hard to pull the animal out without the assistance of his neighbours, but was at last compelled to summon help. The horse was rescued unhurt.

TRAINS BLOCKED.—The blockade of the Kent Northern by the storm last week prevented the opening of court until Thursday. Thursday evening it began drifting, again and the train did not reach the Junction till Saturday evening. The Buctouche & Moncton train was also blocked. It made its first trip to Moncton Wednesday.

THE VERDICT.—As we go to press the jury in the Gogain case by their verdict find Theodore Gogain and Damien T. Gogain not guilty, and find Sylvain T. Gogain guilty of unlawfully wounding under the fifth count of the indictment, and not guilty under the remaining five counts. Judge Wells thereupon sentenced Sylvain Gogain to two years imprisonment in the penitentiary at Dorchester. William Gould was sentenced to six years imprisonment, two years for each offence. It then adjourned sine die.

—The jury in the Antoinette case in St. John, returned a verdict of not guilty.

—Lodge St. Andrews, No 16 F. & A. M held a regular meeting last Monday evening.

—A number of the young people of the town enjoyed themselves at a dance in the Masonic Hall last Thursday evening.

—We have to acknowledge the receipt of a calendar from Messrs. Wilson & Scellen manufacturers of collars, caskets etc., St. John.

—The Presbyterian Church Moncton, was burned to the ground last Sunday evening. Loss to \$30,000. Insurance \$17,000.

—Wheary the colored mute, at Fredericton, charged with murdering his sister-in-law was found guilty and sentenced to be hanged. The verdict contained an appeal for mercy.

—James Alexander & Co., general merchants, Campbellton, have assigned to Mr. Lingley, of that town. The liabilities are large—one report says over \$30,000.

—John Kenny, baker, of Chatham, has assigned to James F. Connors, making no preferences. The estate is nominally worth twelve hundred dollars and the liabilities are about thirteen hundred.

—The Bathurst correspondent of the Northern Enterprise says: Messrs. Skinner, Fowler and Lawlor are here trying to settle the school business. It is to be hoped they will succeed. Both parties have made propositions which may or may not be accepted.

—Two carloads of sheep for the local market passed through here yesterday via the I. C. R., from Buctouche. The animals were well cared for and but one of the lot died in transit. An investigation is being held into the case of a carload of cattle which arrived recently from Dorchester. When the car arrived in St. John, seven of the cattle were loose and had hooked some of the others, one in particular, very badly. The car was not provided with bedding as required by law.

—Miss Ada Flood, the little daughter of the late Patrick Flood, of Chatham, received, on January 14th, three thousand dollars. It was left her by her aunt Susan, who died of consumption at Plymouth, England. She was the wife of W. J. Agence, sea captain, of England, and eldest daughter of the late William Lawford, school master at Halifax, but formerly of Miramichi. Miss Flood also received on the 2nd inst., three hundred dollars, left for her by her aunt Jane, who died December 27th, at Portlaur, Maine, of pneumonia.—World.

—A Caraqueet correspondent of the Sun writes: There has been no train from Bathurst since the 8th inst. If the railway has closed down for the winter it will be a serious loss to the business men and the general public along the line, especially those who have made arrangements for their usual winter traffic under the supposition that the line would be operated as formerly. It is said that the manager intends making an effort to open the road at an early day. It is to be hoped this report is correct. The weather is very fine at present and it would not require extraordinary efforts to clear the track. Some twenty-five sled loads of smelt left here yesterday for Bathurst (I. C. R.) station to be forwarded by rail to the United States markets.

—At the annual meeting of the Restigouche and Victoria R. B. Co. held at Campbellton on the 11th inst., the secretary announced that the survey had cost over a thousand dollars, and the stock list amounted as yet to \$2,500. Mr. Hazen, C. E., was questioned by the directors as to the prospect of building the first 15 miles. His report was a very favorable one. The following directors were elected.—Kilgour Shives, Hon. C. H. LaBil. lois, M. P. P., L. Theriault, M. P. P., A. E. Alexander and A. G. Adams. At a subsequent meeting Kilgour Shives was elected president; Wm. Murray, sec.; Hon. J. C. Barberie, solicitor, and J. P. Mowat, treasurer. Hon. C. H. LaBillois and Wm. Murray, ex-M. P. P., were appointed a committee to solicit further subscriptions to the stock list. Mr. McAllister, M. P. who retired from the board of directors, thanked the members of the company for the honor they had conferred on him in the past and promised to do all in his power to have an additional subsidy voted during the coming session. Further stock has been subscribed as follows: John McAllister, \$1,000; Mayor Alexander \$1,000; K. Shives, \$1,000; J. P. Mowat, \$500; Wm. Glover, \$500.
