Mrs. Edwin Seely is having a birthday party to-day.

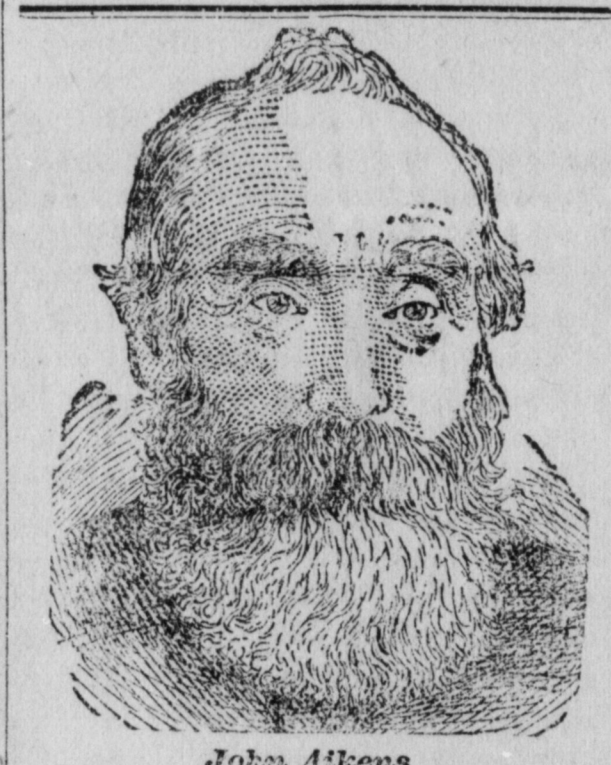
There was a party at Mr. Budreau's on Wednesday night. It was quite a gathering. Dancing was kept up quite late.
