The Sheriff's Grand Jury by Henry O'Leary, their foreman, presented the following address:—  
To His Honor Justice Wells, Judge of THE COUNTY COURTS OF WEST-MORLAND AND KENT,  
May it please Your Honor: We, the Grand Inquest of the County of Kent, take this opportunity of presenting you with an address of welcome on this your first visit as Judge to the County of Kent. We sincerely and heartily congratulate you on your elevation to the honorable position you now occupy as one of the County Court Judges of this province, from what we know of you in your past position as one of the leading barristers of this province the way in which you conducted your business while a working barrister, the great ability and energy you at all times displayed in conducting your cases before the courts and in looking after the interests of your clients, lead us to believe that in you we have not only an able learned Judge, but one in whose hands the scales of Justice will always be evenly balanced. While we cannot upon this occasion say that our County is entirely free from crime, yet we can look back to its past history as one which reflects credit upon ourselves. In this address we believe that we not only voice the sentiments of ourselves but feel satisfied we do that of the County at large in wishing you many years of happiness in your new and honorable position, and that you visit to the County in your capacity as Judge, may always be looked forward to by you with pleasure.

His Honor responded in a few well chosen remarks, thanking the Jurors for their kind wishes and promising to discharge to the best of his ability, the duties which would devolve upon him.

William Gould, when arraigned under the three charges preferred against him, pleaded "not guilty," to the first two. He admitted stealing the money from McInerney's Hotel. His trial on the two charges of breaking and entering was then taken up and lasted only a short time, the jury in each case returning a verdict of guilty. He was undefended. He was then remanded to gaol to await sentence. The three Goguens were then arraigned on the charge of wounding Florian P. LeBlanc, and pleaded not guilty. An application was made by D. I. Welch, attorney for the accused, asking that the trial be postponed till April, owing to the absence of a material witness. Application refused. The following jury was selected to try the case, viz:—Euseb Come, Cyriaque Daigle, John Jardine, Hugh Jardine, John McInerney, Frank McInerney, Wm. Beattie, Mosis Barriean, James McLelland, Urban Babiniau, Ephraim Pine and Robert Hutchison, Jr. The trial then began and has not yet been concluded. C. J. Sayre, Clerk of the Court, is prosecuting. G. V. McInerney appears as associate Counsel for the defence. The following witnesses gave evidence for the Crown, viz:—Geo. Hayes, Henry A. White, Mark LeBlanc, Wm. Johnston, Eustache Gogain, Fred Hebert, Elcar Comeau, Calixte Noel, Adolph Goguen, Joseph Riley, Fred White and Florian P. LeBlanc. The testimony given does not materially differ from that given before the Justice at the preliminary hearing of the case. The first witness called for the defence was Miss Belliveau, who testified to the fact that the chain fastening the school door had been broken on the night of Oct. 31st last.

**THE PRISONERS STORY.**  
Sylvain T. Goguen, one of the prisoners. Am 27 years old, work at carpenter work, live with father. As working at school house, had a job to construct water closet also fix doors and put in windows. Had finished water closet on the 31st Oct. Had also completed doors and windows. In consequence of what I heard went and took my supper and then went to my uncle Adalphe's and said, "I want your gun to watch my buildings." He gave me the gun and one cartridge loaded. I then went home and took supper. I told my sister I wanted to go and watch the school house my father said he was going to his brother Job's. I did not show my father the gun nor tell him I had it. Father started down to Job's ahead of us. Job lives 1/2 mile further down Main Road. Damien and I went to school house yard about 1/2 or 3/4 of an hour there before father came. We were in the bush near

school house when father came, father came to same place. After that saw 3 men coming. Thought they came down river. Saw three fellows go to school house and saw a fellow shut the door. I heard something break. Saw door shut. I started, my father and brothers started too. The door was shut, saw it shut. I fired the gun towards top of door, not to hurt anybody. The door was shut when I got there. I held the gun up not to my shoulders. My father did not ask me to fire the gun. I fired it myself and neither my father nor anyone else told me to fire it. Some one came out 10 or 12 ft. from the door. I put the gun on the ground and took off my coat. Saw 2 men on the road. I never took a stick to touch them. Henry said "Stop Sylvain" once or twice. After that I saw one run down the road, I took my overcoat and gun and my father and brother and I went down. Heard a wagon, it was Calixte Noel with a load of barrels. We went to Uncle John's about 300 yards off, stayed there 5 or 10 minutes. Told Uncle John 2 or 3 fellows had gone into school. Then I, Uncle John, cousins and father went back to school with lantern. Looked at chain, it was broken. Found the pistol on the floor. Looked at windows, south side glass broken. We all went home. Didn't know that night about Florian being shot, heard it next morning at chapel. Went to chapel at 8 or 9. Talked about the shooting. Saw a number of people there. Somebody asked me "Did you shoot last night?" Said yes, but not to hurt anybody. Some one said "Florian White is pretty near to die and they thought I did it" I said "I would be surprised if Florian was hurt." If I said my father told me to shoot I didn't understand it. Didn't intend to kill or hurt anyone. I fired to go over the door. My father didn't tell me to fire. I don't think I told anyone that. I stayed home till 4 or 5 o'clock when I was taken away by the constable with my father and brother to Peter White's. Saw Mark White, Wm. Johnson, Fred Hebert and one or two women. Florian was in bed. Askea Florian if he thought I had shot him. He said he didn't know.

Cross examined.—Asked uncle for gun aid I didn't want to hurt, only to scare. I didn't unload it after that. Cartridge in my pocket. Damien was with me at school. Eighty feet from school house to woods. Damien and I got behind bushes. We were there an hour before we saw anyone come. Saw three fellows. They passed about 100 feet from us. After they passed down about an hour father came up. Father was with us about one-half hour before they came back. Didn't see them till they came in the yard. They were talking English. Muzzle of gun was about three feet from the door when I fired. Father was 8 or 10 feet away from us. When he left the bushes he said he wanted to find out who it was. I fired to scare them. The outside door was open. Henry White came to the door. Said twice, "Sylvain, stop. You've done enough." Didn't know I had hurt anyone. Didn't see Damien there. Didn't see my father hit Henry or knock off his hat. Damien came from south side and said, "That fellow is getting clear." Went to uncle's and told him I had fired in the air. Uncle said we ought to go and see if they had done any mischief. Didn't hear Florian say "Heavens, I'm shot." Found hole in door when we went back. Uncle said "You didn't hurt anyone?" I said I fired too high for that. My father didn't tell me to get the gun. He said he'd go and watch school house with me. I didn't tell him I had the gun. I didn't hear father say anything after I fired the gun. I went to school next morning at 7 or 8 o'clock. I went to see if any damage was done by them. Closet about 80 feet from school. I didn't hear my father say to Florian that he was sorry but didn't know it was Florian. Saw women in room, not bed room. To Court.—Jerry Gogain, Dossy Fredrick, all started from Uncle Taddy's house together. We went to mass together. Came back about 12.30. Father got back about 4 or 5 p. m. I think father was at Uncle Damien's house.

The evidence of Theodore Gogain corroborated that of Sylvain. Albert Dysart also gave testimony for the defence. Mr. McInerney addressed the jury for the defence, and Mr. Sayre for the prosecution. Judge Wells' charge occupied over an hour. The jury retired at 5.30 last evening.

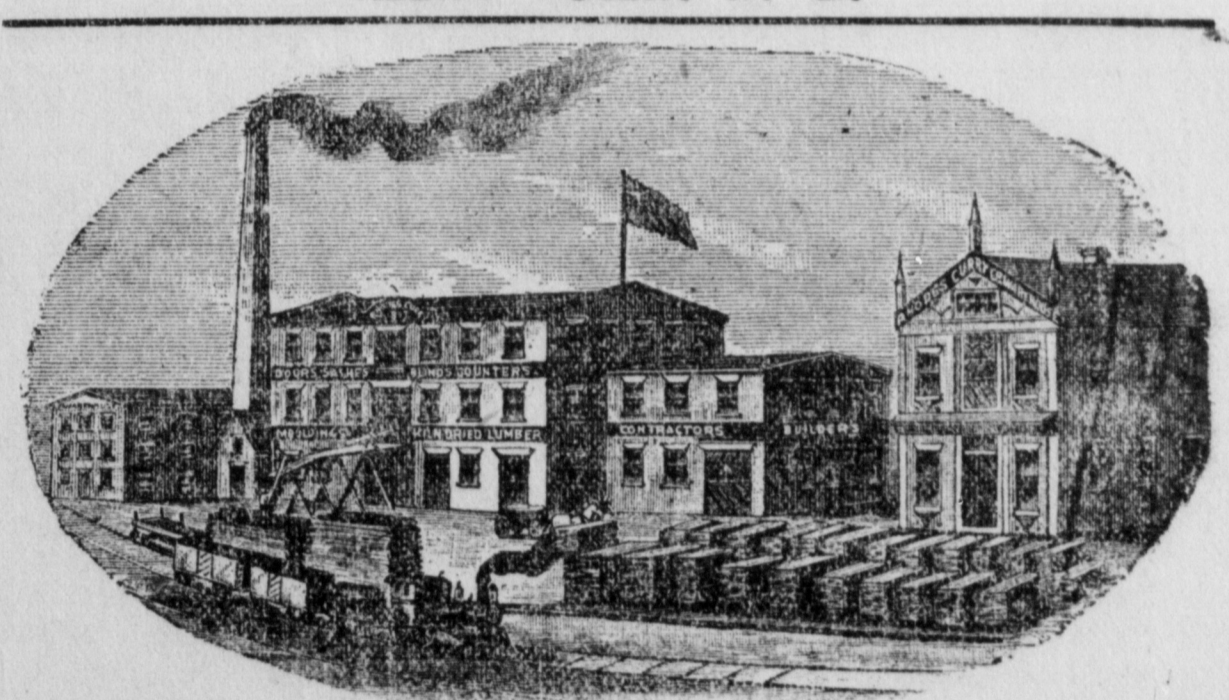
