A fine run of salmon struck the beaches Saturday. Lobsters have slackened off to almost nothing and several of the packers are taking up their traps.

Mr. Thomas Keswick, who has been in the tea business in India and China for some years, has returned to his old home in Buctouche, to reside there permanently.

The pupils of the Kouchibouguac school under the direction of the teacher Miss Edgar, will give a concert in the school house there on the evening of the second of July.

Mr. Richard McLaughlin, who was stricken with paralysis at Monte Video, South American about a year ago and subsequently recovered, suffered another attack Friday.

Mr. C. F. Brown and four children arrived here Saturday, from Aspen, Colorado. Mrs. Brown is a daughter of Mrs. Z. Phinney, and has been absent in the west thirteen years.

About one hundred and fifty of the young generation of Kingston gathered at the Cedars, Saturday night, armed with shot guns, whistles, tin cans, etc., to pay their respects to Mr. R. P. Doherty and bride.

The will of the late Wm. Bowser was probated before Judge of Probate H. H. James, at Richibucto, Friday. Phinney & Carter, proctors. Captain James Gordon, Dr. J. C. Bowser and Edwin Bowser are the executors.

The potato bug promises to keep the farmers busy this season. They have already put in an appearance in unprecedented numbers. At Buctouche Bay one day last week a regular shower of these pests invaded the potato fields.

The Chatham World says:—Mr. Thos Vanstone was quite seriously injured on Saturday by being thrown out of his wagon, which collided with another on Waterstreet. He is, however, recovering under treatment by Dr. Baxter.

One of the heaviest thunder storms ever experienced here passed over Richibucto Sunday morning. The lightning struck several trees around but failed to do any damage. The accompanying shower was hailed with delight by farmers.

Miss Annie K. Murray, daughter of John Murray, formerly of Kingston, was among the number who received the degree of Bachelor of Arts at the recent convocation of Manitoba University. Miss Murray graduated with first class honors and enjoys the distinction of being the youngest lady graduate of the University.

The bridge over Black River, on the Bay Road, to which attention was called last week, was found to be on fire Saturday. The bridge has been in an unsafe condition for some time and some person or persons evidently concluded it would be safer if entirely destroyed. The fire was extinguished before it had made much headway.

The main portion of the new Catholic church at Buctouche, which is said to be the largest wooden structure in Canada, was occupied by the congregation last Sunday for the first time. The interior decorations are not yet completed, with the exception of the altar and sanctuary rail. The panels of the latter are covered with small paintings of flowers and religious emblems, the work of Father L'Archeveque, formerly assistant to Father Michaud.

The lobster packers along the coast received an unexpected visit last week from Fishery Overseer, Fred Hannah. The fishery regulations prohibit the packing of lobsters smaller than nine inches, and the packers were in some cases packing as small as six and a half inch lobsters. Complaint was made and Inspector R. A. Chapman visited Richibucto, Friday, and imposed a fine on nearly every packer along the coast. The heaviest punishment was meted out to R. Gregan, manager of W. S. Loggie's factory, on the Kouchibouguac Beach. Mr. Gregan was fined \$40.00 and costs.

Particulars of the Kaslo, B. C., storm have been received. The loss, it is thought will reach \$100,000. The Galena Trading Company's store, Bir's hardware store, the Government wharf and about 70 houses were swept away. The only life lost was that of Mrs. D. C. Gregory. The storm came up between four and five o'clock.

It was preceded by a number of hot waves, then came a terrific gale, which filled the air with debris, churned the lake into a mighty sea and blew buildings into the water. Meanwhile the river was dammed by a log jam and scores of cabins along its banks were ruined.

Messrs. Clifford Atkinson and Joseph A. Grogan, of Kouchibouguac, went to Fredericton, Monday.

Normal School examinations terminated last week, and student teachers have returned to their homes to await the result. Martin L. Richard arrived home Saturday.

The examinations in the Public Schools of Richibucto will be held as follows.—On Monday afternoon, June 25th, the examination for grading will take place in the Primary Department, for pupils from the Primary to the Intermediate; on Tuesday afternoon, June 26th, in the Intermediate, for pupils from the Intermediate to the Advanced; on Wednesday afternoon, June 27th, in the Advanced, for pupils from the Advanced to the Grammar School. It is very desirable that all pupils seeking promotion should be in their classes at these examinations. The public examinations will begin on Thursday, June 28th. In the Primary department from 9 a. m. to 12; in the Intermediate on Thursday, from 1 p. m. to 4 p. m.; in the Advanced on Friday, from 9 a. m. to 12; and in the Grammar School on Friday, from 1 p. m. to 4 p. m. Parents and all interested, are most cordially invited to be present at these exercises.
