In all cases name, color, sex of animal, and name of owner are required. Entries close Monday, July 9th, at 6 o'clock, p. m. Horses will be called at 1.30 o'clock, p. m., and started at 2, local time.

The Story of Young McKay's Death.

To the Editor of The Review:

The death of Herbert McKay, of this place, has been a great shock to every one. There are a great many reports in circulation and I would like to give the facts of the case as far as they are known to me. On the morning of the 4th of June I, in company with a young lady of this place, started to go to Bass River to do some shopping. On the way we stopped at Alexander McKay's for a few minutes. Mrs. McKay, mother of deceased, was in the garden, and we stood talking with her Bert, (as every one called him) came to the front door. I greeted him by saying "Good morning, where have you been?" "Away looking for the cow," he replied, "She has been away since Sunday morning." At their request we went into the house. The front room of the house looked into the garden.

A few commonplace remarks were passed as we sat there. Mrs. McKay proposed that we have a cup of tea before going further, but 'twas ordered otherwise. "Bert," who had been sitting on the doorstep, got up as we thought to go to James Clair's on an errand for his mother. As he rose he stumbled but did not fall. He staggered back to the doorstep again and threw himself down but did not speak to us. We thought he was fainting and his mother ran for water. I got him to his feet, when looking up at me he said, "I do not know what is the matter with me,

I have lost the use of my legs." His head seemed burning, and with a little aid he walked to the lounge in the dining room. He tried to get to his feet twice but failed. I thought first it was sunstroke. He seemed very sick to his stomach. His mother cried "Get him some salt and water, 'twill maybe help him." But it had no effect. A third time he rose to his feet, took two steps, then throwing up his hands and exclaiming "My God what is the matter with me," he fell as though shot." I ran to James Clair's for help, and he told them it was no use doing anything for him he was dying. Against his wish we sent for the doctor. We carried him out, (with the assistance of a young man who had come in) and laid him on the floor of the front room where he could get plenty of air. A few minutes before he died he held up the fore finger of the left hand exclaiming, "That finger did it." "Did what, Bertie," his mother asked, "Did you take anything to make you this way?" "Oh no, no, no," he replied, "it was with that finger I put the poison in the stove this morning!" I was going to shingle the roof of the kitchen and the poison was on the roof in a basket and I brought it down to burn it." He called us all to him before he died and bade us good-bye. There was nothing said about taking us to Bass River until just before the last convulsion as I was trying to place the pillows so as to make his head more comfortable he looked up at me and said, "I was going to drive you to Bass River this afternoon." I replied "You will perhaps live to go to Bass River yet many times, Bert, don't give up." "Oh no!" said he, "I am going to die to day, you

will bury me day after to-morrow." He made his peace with God and died in one of those terrible convulsions.

Perhaps some day when all is made clear we will know how poor Bert came to his death. It is very strange, and to those who were with him at the time of his death, 'twill be terrible. God grant I may never have to witness the like again. To his poor father, mother, and sister, what a blow! And then to have to listen to the comments of the world at large. How few there are that "try to do as they are done by." It is for the sake of the public at large I have written this letter and the particulars of the case as far as are known to me are recorded here. 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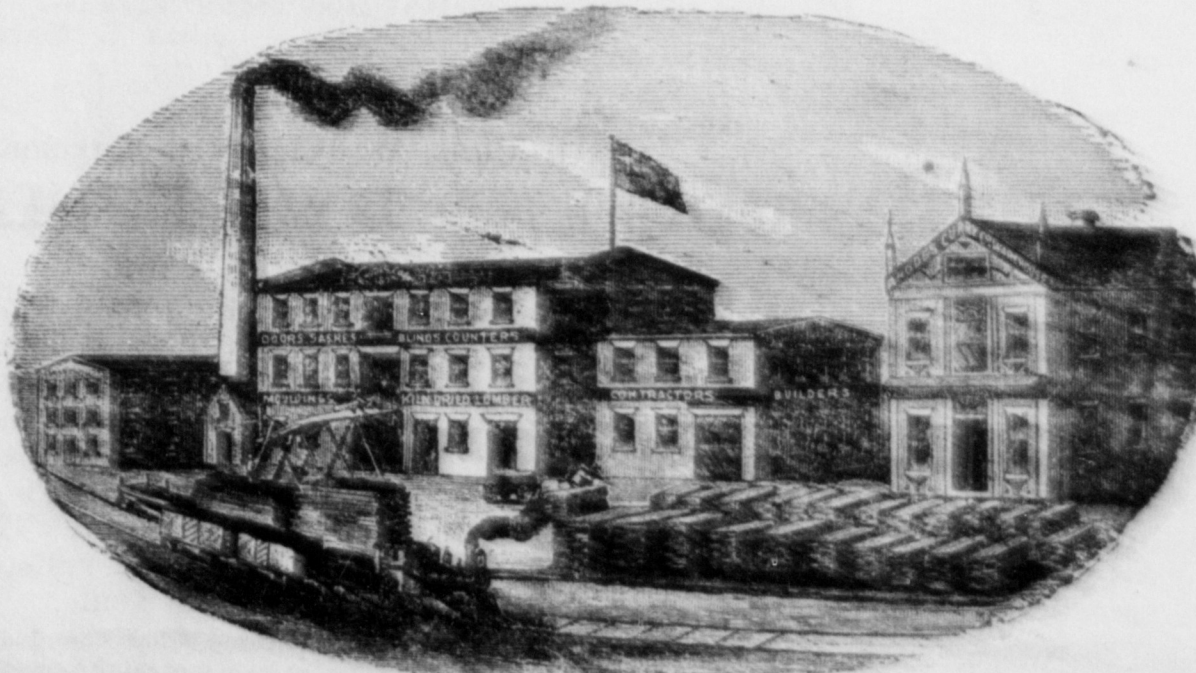
