Committee be appointed to morrow at 10 o'clock a. m. Carried.

Warden appoints Gaol Committee as follows:—Frank M. Richard, D. McAlmon and Alexander Murray.

The Warden presents Petition from Abraham Pineau, protesting against return of Sylvain Barrieau as Councillor for Acadiaville, which is read by Secretary. W. D. Carter calls attention of the Council to the fact that he appears before them as Pineau's attorney. Petition sets forth that election is fraudulent and illegal and asks to make Barrieau's election void. Numerous affidavits read in support of Pineau's petition.

Councillor Atkinson asks if certain regulations have been complied with, as required by Sec. 7 (Bye laws, Kent Municipality.) Bond for \$200.00 produced and read by Secretary. W. D. Carter by permission addresses the Council, contending that Barrieau's return is illegal and fraudulent, inasmuch as chairman of No. 1 District, should have accepted return of chairman No. 2, instead of which he recounts the ballots, altering the figures and returning Barrieau in opposition to the actual count, making a difference of 2 votes from the original tally.

Mr. Hutchinson, Clerk of the Peace, says the Bond is sufficient, but if committee of seven is appointed as required by Sec. 7, they have no authority to take evidence under oath, but if affidavits as furnished are correct the election of Barrieau is illegal. Chairman of No. 1 should have returned the figures as given by No. 2, and not made the alteration he did. The defence has a right to put in counter affidavits, and 3/4 vote of Council would be necessary to unseat the present incumbents.

Councillor Atkinson moved, seconded by Bernard, that committee of seven be appointed to investigate and report on said Petition at afternoon session to-morrow, 2 o'clock. The following committee appointed by Warden:—B. J. Johnson, G. Richard, T. McMaster, Ruben J. Rhader, Anselm Bourgeois, Simon Bourgeois and Alex. Murray.

Council adjourned until to-morrow at 10 a. m., to allow Finance Committee to go into session. WEDNESDAY, 10 A. M.

Council called to order, minutes of last meeting read and approved. Councillor F. Richard submits report of Gaol Committee for last year, finds the Gaol in first class condition and compliments the late Sheriff on his management of it.—Adopted.

Warden submits Wharf Committee report. Councillor McAlmon, member of the late Wharf Committee says wharf sold to Geo. W. Robertson for \$35.00 not being able to get other bids, two notes for amount given, one paid, the other note Robertson objects to paying on account of wharf being carried away and destroyed last fall, and no reuts for it in consequence. Report accepted.

Councillor Murphy moves, seconded by B. Johnson, that all delinquent non-resident tax in County be placed in the hands of a collecting magistrate selected by the board, and he be instructed to proceed immediately to collect the same. Carried.

Councillor Bernard moves that Gaol Committee be appointed. Warden appoints F. M. Richard, D. McAlmon, A. Murray, as such committee.

Public Works, and had several conversations with him relating to it, had also memorials re other public wharfs, Brown's Yard, Main River, Buctouche wharf,—the Minister had the petitions before him and gave Mr. McInerney to understand that they would not purchase any of the old public wharfs in this or other counties, but if the Kent Municipality gave the Dominion Government possession of it they might keep it in repair. This he would not agree to, and urged on them to buy the wharf, which was not acceded to. He thought possibly at some later date they might look more favourably on it.

Councillor Murphy says after hearing the Secretary thinks not much chance of selling to Dominion Government and recommends disposing of it by auction to some outsider for private use.

Councillor F. Richard has brighter hopes in the future for the wharf—thinks it may yet be sold. Dept. have already sent engineers to make survey,—but asks the people of Richibucto Parish to work energetically in getting up petitions. This course was taken as applied to St. Louis and Dundas wharf and they were successful. He objects to any further money being expended on it at present.

Councillor Atkinson agrees with Richard Will not favor any more expenditure on it. Richibucto being more interested than outside parishes should get up petition to Dominion Government and not ask other parishes to repair it. Secretary McInerney dissents from this, and suggests that Council renew memorial to Dominion Government.

After lengthy discussion on the subject in which Councillors Murphy, Johnson, Leger, Girouard, Bernard, and others take part, Councillor Richard moves, seconded by Johnson, that committee of five be appointed to ascertain best means of disposing of wharf, and report at two o'clock to-morrow. Committee as follows:—Warden, A. Murray, F. Richard, B. Johnson, T. McMaster.

Councillor Johnson moves that the report of Inspector of Liquor Licences be handed in at 2 o'clock to-morrow afternoon. Councillor Atkinson moves that auditors report be handed in to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

Council adjourned until 2 p. m. today. WEDNESDAY, 2 P. M.

Council called to order. Councillor Johnson presents majority report re Pineau petition as follows:—

The committee having met, beg to report as follows:— Municipal election committee's report. Your committee having met beg to report as follows:—

Having examined the petition of Abraham Pineau and the bye laws of Kent Co. Municipal Council, and found that nothing authorizes us to swear witness and hear evidence, and your committee not wishing to assume the responsibility to swear witness and take evidence, therefore recommend that no action be taken.

The following minority report was also submitted:—

We the undersigned members of the committee appointed to investigate the facts set forth in the petition against the election of Sylvain Barrieau as councillor for the parish of Acadiaville, hereby submit the following minority report:—

We find that the action of the chairman of District of No. 1 was illegal in refusing to accept the return of chairman of Dis. No. 2 and in proceeding to recount the ballots of that district, and we recommend that the election of said Sylvain Barrieau be declared void and the seat vacant.

ANSELME BOURGEOIS. GILBERT RICHARD. Committee Room, Richibucto.

Councillor Atkinson, seconded by Bernard, moves that minority report be accepted. Councillor F. Richard, seconded by B. Johnson in amendment, moves that majority report be accepted. Councillor Atkinson speaking on the subject thinks there is room for discussion, says report of minority has got some reason according to affidavits furnished, that the Clerk of the Peace pronounces the action

of the chairman illegal, feels it so himself and will vote to unseat Barrieau. Councillor Murphy in seconding Councillor Atkinson's resolution, says that the vote in this question will furnish evidence of the intelligence of the board.

Councillors Richard and Johnson also discuss the question. Their contention being that the practice hitherto was that the council accepted the majority report, also that they, the council, have no right to take evidence under oath, that the time of the council is too valuable to give it the attention necessary.

Councillor Barrieau by permission of the Board says that he was not notified that protest was against him, therefore not prepared with witnesses, and asks the indulgence of the members.

The amendment was lost by the following vote:—

Yeas.—Councillors F. M. Richard, B. J. Johnson, S. Bourgeois, F. Bordage, T. McMaster, A. Murray, R. J. Richard, M. Girouard.—8.

Nays.—T. Atkinson, R. Murphy, Jos. Bernard, J. V. Leger, A. Bourgeois, G. Richard, R. Poirier, M. Daigle, G. B. Coates.—9.

Minority report then put by Warden, was carried by the following vote:— Yeas.—T. Atkinson, R. Murphy, Jos. Bernard, Leger, A. Bourgeois, G. Richard, R. Poirier, Daigle, G. B. Coates, M. Girouard.—10.

Nays.—F. M. Richard, B. J. Johnson, S. Bourgeois, F. Bordage, McMaster, A. Murray, R. J. Richard, D. McAlmon.—8.

Councillor Atkinson, second by Murphy moved that Barrieau's seat be declared vacant, which motion being put the vote stood yeas 10, nays 8. Councillors voting as in minority report motion.

Petition fails not having the necessary 3/4 vote of the whole Council, and Councillor Barrieau retains his seat.

Council adjourned until 10 a. m. to-morrow.
