This gives in round figures a majority by counties for prohibition of over 60,000 which, with the 8,000 aggregate majority given by the cities of Ontario, swells the total majority for prohibition to over 68,000.

About a hundred places in sparsely settled and back districts have not yet reported to the central committee or to the Government. While they will not change the relative position of the counties, they are confidently expected to increase the total majority to a round hundred thousand.

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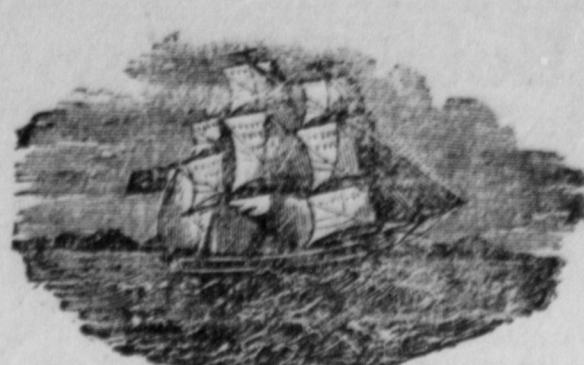
