Dominion Parliament.

(Continued from Page 4.)

OTTAWA, March 16.—Sir James Grant moved and Dr. La Chappell seconded the address in reply to the speech this afternoon.

Mr. Laurier rose amid cheers from the opposition. In his early remarks he renewed those cheers by alluding to the victory of the Fielding government in Nova Scotia the day before. The delay in summoning parliament was condemned and the opinion expressed that it was due to the Wilson bill. The government was looking to Washington. He denounced the idea of the government conducting public business in secret. Mr. Laurier could surmise however, what was going on. The government was feeling the pulse of the manufacturers, but each manufacturer, like "Sweet Jack Falstaff" in the comedy, was only willing to sacrifice his neighbor to the popular outcry for a reduction of duties. Even the minister of finance exclaimed: "Reduce the duties on boots and shoes, on clothing, on dry goods, but banish not good wine." He contrasted the secrecy of the conference between the government and the manufacturers with the publicity given to those between the controllers and farmers. Mr. Laurier declared that the prosperity in Canada reminded the farmers of the bee who laid up stores only to have them taken by others. The Behring award, Mr. Laurier could not help thinking, was a bad one for Canada, and in proof he pointed out that Sir John Thompson had himself dissented from the regulations in that award. He rallied Mr. Foster on the delay in presenting the report of the prohibition commission appointed no doubt by the finance minister in a moment of weakness. He demanded from the government a declaration as to the French treaty with which they had dilly-dallied.

Sir John Thompson adhered to the view that they could not revise their tariff without reference to the Wilson bill. That bill might yet be unfinished, yet they would have done the best they could to allow of a knowledge of what was being done at Washington. They also wished to see what congress is willing to do in the direction of an enhancement of trade between the two countries. The government was sincere in desiring to take measures for an increase of trade with the United States. Dealing with the Behring Sea award he admitted that the regulations were too severe and in some respects inadequate. The illegality of the seizures by the United States had, however been established and declared. The award on whole was satisfactory to Canada. The government would bring down its policy on the little French treaty when it was ready.

Sir Richard J. Cartwright dwelt at length on the Behring Sea award, which he described as a disaster to our trade and commerce and with regard to which the British government had not, he held, done its duty towards Canada. He took the ground that the treatment by Ottawa of the government of the United States gave Great Britain an excuse for the course pursued. Their policy had for many years been first to bluster and snarl and then to cringe. Canada has come out of the award with the shell and the United States got the oyster. Sir Richard blamed the government for not having seized the opportunity of arbitration to have our rights in the Atlantic fisheries recognized. He demanded a free hand for Canada to settle her difficulties with the United States. Dr. McDonald, of Huron, moved the adjournment of the debate and will continue it on Monday.

The budget will be delivered on Wednesday next. Ottawa, March 19.—Mr. Charlton is moving for a return showing the number of land grants in Manitoba and the territories since 1870 to religious denominations, and other particulars. The St. Lawrence canal expenditure is to be inquired into, particularly the Gallops Rapids Channel scheme. Mr. Mulock is moving for all papers connected with investigations into penitentiary irregularities and for a copy of contract with John Connor, of St. John, N. B., for the equipment of the new binder twine factory at Kingston. Mr. Charlton intends to investigate certain rumors concerning the government cattle ranch near Fort McLeod. All correspondence or other documents relative to the superannuation of Mr. L. Van Koughnet, late Deputy Superintendent General of Indian Affairs, will be moved for on Wednesday.

for on Wednesday. Mr. Van Koughnet protested against his superannuation. Col. Prior will enquire if the government will use their influence with the Imperial authorities to cease employing Chinese laborers on Esquimaux fortifications and make use of the large surplus of white labor now on the Pacific coast instead.

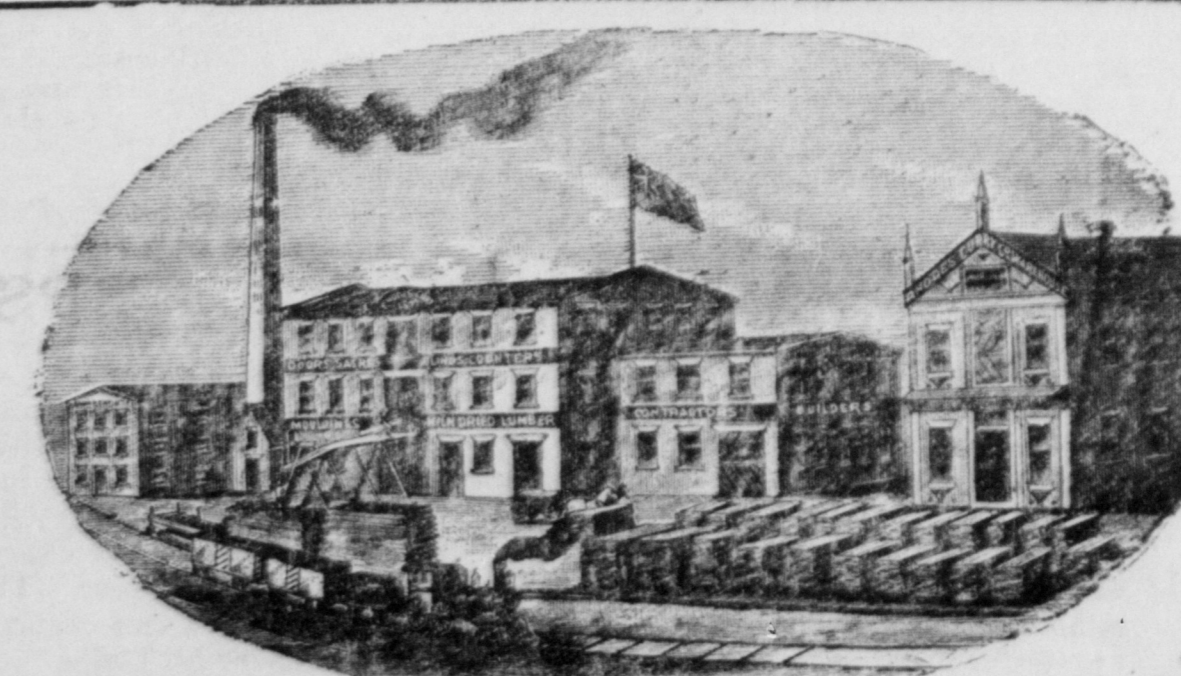
