Mr. Laurier rose amid cheers from the opposition. In his early remarks he renewed those cheers by alluding to the victory of the Fielding government in Nova Scotia the day before. The delay in summoning parliament was condemned and the opinion expressed that it was due to the Wilson bill. The government was looking to Washington. 




