Lawlor, of Chatham, appearing to show cause against an order nisi for certiorari in ex parte Johnson granted by Judge Palmer to remove the school assessment of the town of Bathurst with the view to quashing the same. C. N. Skinner, Q. C. and Geo. W. Fowler appeared to support the order. Chapter 51 of the Consolidated Statutes relating to county courts, is to be amended as follows: For the county of Queens, the term shall commence on the fourth Tuesday in May and not on the fourth Tuesday in June, and the June term of the said court is hereby abolished; the January term of the County court of the county of Sunbury is hereby abolished; and the January term of the County court of the county of Kent is hereby abolished. The partnership existing between George W. Robertson of Richibucto, and Wm. J. Emmerson of Boston, has been dissolved by mutual consent. Mr. O'Leary has bought both the Crown Factory and New Gully Factory. Mr. Emmerson will continue the suet business here next winter, and any claims that may have been overlooked, will then be satisfied. Mr. Charlie Webster, of Buctouche, engineer, will run G. K. McLeod's tug "Victor," the coming summer. Charlie ran the "Coluna," last season. Mr. L. J. Wathen of Harcourt, Warden of the Municipal Council, and Councillor Alex. Murray of Welford, were in town Friday on municipal business. Mr. James Haines and E. Hayward of Moncton, spent the past week at the mouth of the harbour gunning, succeeding in bagging a large number of fowl. They report birds very plentiful. The weather of the last week was not likely to make any one think of summer dresses, but we understand Daniel & Robertson are selling a great lot of fancy cotton goods. The attention of the road commissioner is called to the fact that the sidewalk on Queen street from the Court House south, and that on Powell street require cleaning. The roads are now in a bad state for pedestrians. There is a great deal of sickness in and around Buctouche just now, several deaths having taken place there lately. Inflammation of the lungs appears to be the prevalent disease. The weather of late has been bad for such troubles. Mr. Urbain Johnson of St. Louis, ex-M. There having been so little logging done the past winter there will of necessity be very little lumber to carry. The sum of seven dollars was missing which was the whole amount contained in the till with the exception of two pieces of silver, one marked with the letters W. W. and the other having a hole in it. The fact that these were left would indicate that the robber had been wary in his undertaking. It is supposed that the person had been locked in when the store was closed for the night, having secured himself earlier in the evening, and had afterwards escaped by the back door as it was found unbarred and can only be unfastened from the inside.
