Local Legislation
FREDERICTON, April 7.—Pitts presented petitions of grand divisions, Sons of Temperance, praying for certain amendments in the liquor law of 1887 and for a plebiscite on the question of prohibition.
 Emmerson introduced a bill relating to the office of Deputy Sheriffs.
 Sivewright's bill amending the law authorizing the Gloucester municipality to issue debentures was agreed to.
 Powell committed a bill empowering the Sackville Rural Cemetery Company to acquire and expropriate additional lands. Progress was reported with leave to sit again.

Powell introduced a bill respecting St. Joseph's College.
 Adjourned.
FREDERICTON, April 9.—The bill respecting liens of mechanics, laborers, and others was agreed to.
 Blair recommitted the Assessment bill.
 Powell opposed sec. 4 fixing the poll tax at one quarter of the whole sum to be levied and moved that the sum be one sixth.

Blair consented to have the section stand for the present.
 The section taxing railway companies was struck out. Part of sub-section 12 of section 5 providing exemptions was struck out of s. 5-section and amended as follows: "So much of the personal property of any person as is invested in mortgage upon land or is due to him on account of the sale of land, the free or freehold of which is vested in him."
 Sub-section 14 of section 5 was amended so as to exempt the annual income of any person derived from his personal savings to the amount of \$200 instead of \$500 as in bill. Sub-section 15 and 16 of section 5 were struck out with an understanding that they may be dealt with again when the question of poll tax is settled.

Progress was reported with leave to sit again.
 Powell recommitted a bill empowering the Sackville rural cemetery to acquire and expropriate additional lands, Pitts chairman. Agreed to with amendments.
 Powell introduced a bill further relating to the county courts.
 Wells introduced a bill amending the law relating to justices of civil courts.
 Phinney committed a bill to revive and continue an act incorporating the Western Railway Co. Hill chairman. Agreed to with amendments.
 Adjourned at 11.45.

FREDERICTON, April 10.—Stockton's bill amending the law respecting the use of tobacco by minors was agreed to with amendments. The bill as agreed to provides a penalty upon those who, for a consideration, procure for any person under 18 years of age, cigars, cigarettes, tobacco or snuff and also provides a penalty upon minors who refuse to give information from whom they may get tobacco, cigars, cigarettes or snuff.
 Blair introduced a bill respecting registry of deeds and other instruments relating to lands. Under this bill it was proposed to pay registrar's salaries as follows, in case fees amounted to the sum named, if they exceed it the balance to be paid over to the municipality:

Progress was reported with leave to sit again.
 Killam from committee on charges contained in Quinn declaration submitted report, which concludes as follows:
 Your committee, after the most careful examination possible find that there has been nothing in the conduct of the attorney general in connection with any of the matters referred to in said declaration in any, even the slightest degree, reflecting unfavorably upon him or his integrity in office; and the committee therefore find and determine that the attorney general, the honorable Mr. Blair, is wholly exonerated from any expressed or implied charge or imputation of misconduct in said declaration contained.
 Mott gave notice of the following resolution:

That the house do on Friday next resolve itself into a committee of the whole to take into consideration the report of the special committee to whom were referred the charges in the Quinn matter and that report of said committee be referred to the committee of the whole house.

FREDERICTON, April 11.—Pitts made his motion that the house resolve itself into a committee of the whole to consider the report and evidence in the Bathurst school case. Pitts supported the motion in a speech of nearly three hours, reviewing the evidence taken at Bathurst.
 The motion being carried and the house going into committee of the whole, Pitts moved a resolution that the petitioners were justified in asking for an investigation, and that in the administration of the school law all classes and creeds should stand equal before the law.
 White replied to Pitts and moved the following amendment:
 "That considering the many years during which the present school law has been

in operation in this province, the population of which is composed of different creeds and nationalities, it would not be surprising if in remote districts occasional infractions of the school law should occur, and this committee is pleased to learn from the report of the commissioner that the Board of Education has not been negligent in any respect in the discharge of its duty as has been alleged against it and has not countenanced or knowingly permitted any violation of the law."
 The house was called. Stockton rose to speak.
 Blair objected that there had been a call of the house.
 Stockton claimed the amendment had not been read.
 Blair said the reading had been dispensed with.
 Stockton claimed that it had not been dispensed with.
 Chairman ruled against Stockton. The latter appealed to the speaker who decided that there could be no further decision after call of the house. Amendment was then carried, vote being—
 Yeas: Blair, Mitchell, Emmerson, White, Tweedie, Labllois, Gogain, Lewis, Blanchard, Theriault, Russell, Sivewright, Mott, Killam, Smith, (Westmorland,) Flawelling, Scoville, O'Brien, (Northumberland,) Dibblee, Dunn, McLeod, Wells, Farris, Hill, Robinson.—25.
 Nays: Powell, Stockton, Phinney, Shaw, Smith, (St. John,) Alward, Pitts, Allen, Howe, Pinder.—10.

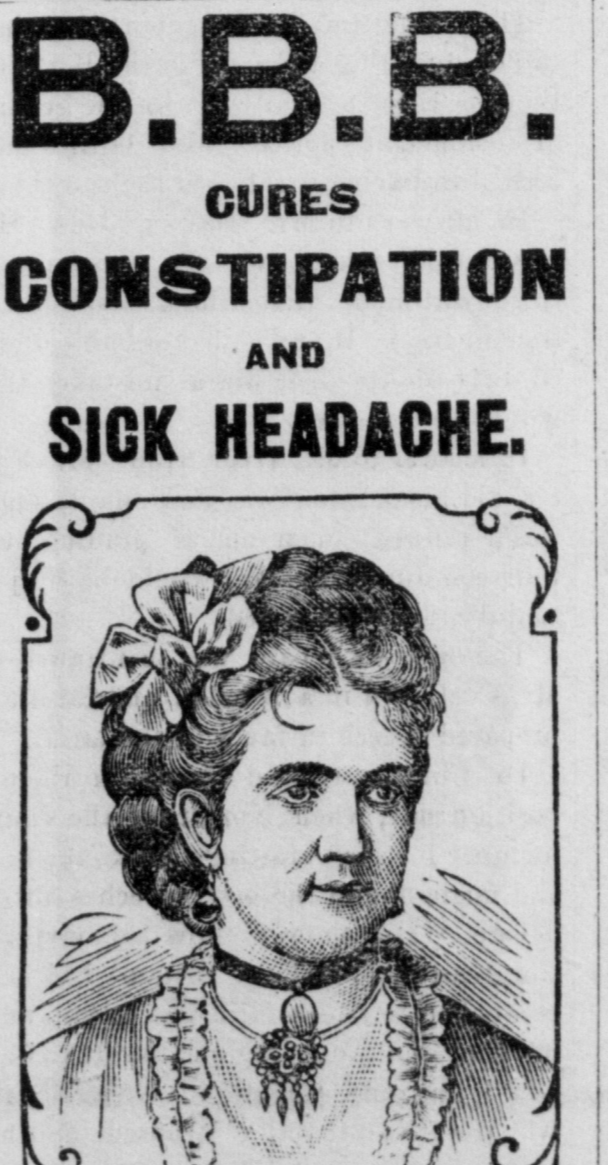
Blair recommitted the registry bill.
 The opposition moved several amendments cutting down the salaries of registrar's, which were defeated. On motion of Killam, salary of Westmorland registrar was fixed at \$2000, instead of \$2,500 as proposed in the bill.
 Phinney moved reconsideration of section 12 so as to vest appointment of registrar in the municipal council. This was lost. The bill was agreed to with amendments.
 Adjourned at 1.15 this p. m. Thursday morning.

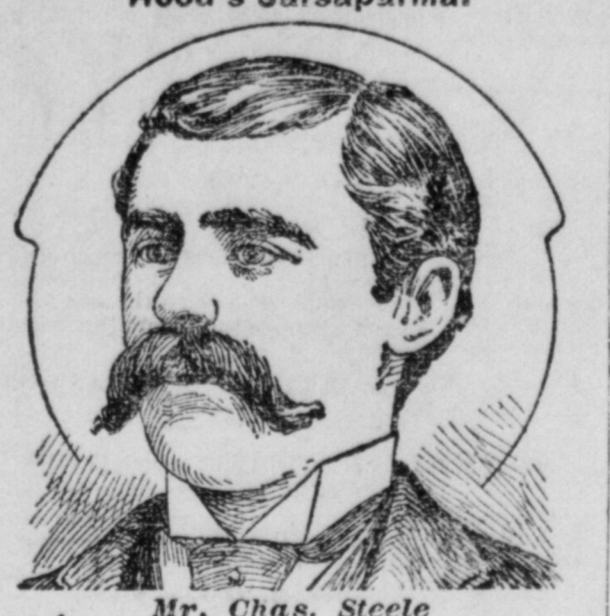
