Dominion Parliament.
OTTAWA, April 10.—In the house today Hon. Mr. Costigan in reply to Mr. Charlton said that the costs of the first revision of the electoral lists under the Dominion franchise act was \$411,000. The cost of the subsequent revisions was \$480,000. The cost of printing the lists in the government bureau was \$28,000 a year.

In answer to Mr. Lawderkin, Hon. Mr. Foster said the total cost of the prohibition commission to date was \$34,000.

In answer to Mr. Bowers, Hon. Mr. Outram said the government had not been informed of the destruction of the Digby pier.

A number of unopposed orders were passed, after which the budget debate was resumed by Mr. Beaudry.

After recess the budget debate was continued by Mr. Taylor, the chief government whip, an excellent speaker. He concluded it by an offer to resign his seat and contest it with Sir Richard Cartwright on the question before the House, neither party to do any campaigning beyond circulating their own speeches. South Leeds is a close constituency, and one in which the verdict could fairly be taken as an indication of the views of the farming population of Ontario.

Sir Richard Cartwright did not accept the offer but some of his friends called out: "Will you contest South Oxford?"

Mr. Taylor replied that South Oxford was a grit stronghold but that if Cartwright preferred it, both counties could be opened and contested on the same terms.

Mr. Casey followed on the opposition side.

In the Senate to-day Mr. Bowell introduced a bill amending the shipping act respecting deckloads, allowing six feet deckloads to the West Indies. It is understood that the government have taken steps to terminate the collection of duties for the benefit of British copyright holders and have also made a formal demand on the British government for the abrogation of the Berne copyright convention, as far as Canada is concerned.

Joe Martin in the course of his speech yesterday made a vicious attack on the promoters of the Hudson Bay Railway, intimating that they were not reputable people and were not conducting the affairs of the company honestly. To-night Hugh Sutherland, the chief promoter of the road, met Mr. Martin in the rotunda of the Russell House and "slapped his ears."

The scrap is the talk of the town and lobbies.

OTTAWA, April 11.—In the House today Controller Wood said, in reply to Mr. Cockburn, that it was the intention of the government to introduce a bill for the regulation and inspection of Electric Light Companies.

Controller Wallace said it was the intention of the government to put certain custom officials in uniform.

The committees having reported against the bill granting a charter to the Boylston Bicycle Electric Railway on the ground of insufficient notice. Mr. Gillies succeeded in having it referred back to them.

In answer to Mr. Davies, Hon. Mr. Foster said that it was the intention of the government that fishing nets should remain free. If any collector had collected duty on them it was a mistake that would be corrected.

In answer to Mr. Dyer, Hon. Mr. Foster said his opinion was that maple sugar was a refined sugar and if grading over fourteen Dutch standard would be subject to duty, when imported.

The budget debate was continued by Mr. Cockburn in a forcible and carefully prepared speech in favor of the tariff.

Dr. Christie replied briefly on the opposition side, when Northrup, the young member for East Hastings, took the floor and made one of the best speeches of the debate. He showed how all civilized countries except Great Britain had been compelled to adopt tariff protection, most of them to a much larger extent than Canada. The only exception is Great Britain, which is exceptionally situated and had in her situation, climate, capital, control of commerce, cheap money and cheap labor, a protection that he believed to be adequate. If Canada were to discard protection she would stand alone in the civilized world experimenting on lines that rich older, more populous and wealthy nations had been compelled to abandon.

Mr. McCarthy rose to reply but it being six o'clock the speaker left the chair.

After recess Mr. McCarthy made a long and strong speech against protection in any and every form. He declared in favor of

the English variety and announced his intention of supporting Cartwright's amendment and assisting the opposition in the forthcoming general election. But he frankly admitted that it was easier to talk of defeating a protectionist party than to do it and he warned his grit allies that it was no small contract they had in hand.

He was replied to by Mr. Masson. Mr. Edwards followed and was replied to by Cartwright.

OTTAWA, April 12.—In the House today Hon. Mr. Foster said, in reply to Sir Richard Cartwright, that the eastern terminus of the last Atlantic line would be in England but that connection would be made with a French port, either by steam or calling or by an extension line.

In answer to Mr. Tarte, Sir John Thompson said the government had conferences with Governor Mackintosh and Premier Haultain of N. W. T., but had not yet received any reply to the government's recommendations respecting the school regulations.

In answer to Mr. Forbes, Sir John said the government was aware that the revising officer for Queen's, N. S., was now in Alabama and they intended to appoint a successor.

On standing orders the committee reported in favor of leave to introduce a bill incorporating the Royston Bicycle Railway and Gillies accordingly introduced the bill.

Mr. Patterson submitted a return asked for by Mr. Mulock respecting the Royal Military College. According to this return the college had so far cost \$920,000 and is costing for staff \$37,300 per annum. The total number of graduates turned out by the school since its establishment in 1879 was one hundred and ninety five. Last year the graduates numbered thirteen and the total cadets in attendance fifty eight.

Sir John Thompson laid on the table the return re the John V. Ellis case, asked for by Mr. Davies. It consists wholly of the record of the court when Ellis was sentenced.

The budget debate was resumed by Mr. Laurier. He was in good form and spoke well and was generously applauded by his friends in the house, who were present in force. His speech consisted of the usual free trade arguments. He held that protection could not be made to benefit the farmer, hence it must be unjust if it benefited the manufacturer. If given power he could not promise to do away with protection in the tariff all at once but would work towards free trade. He admitted that in his youth he had favored protection and had made one speech in 1871 in its favor but when he looked into the matter he had renounced the doctrine of protection principally because he found out that Papien's reason for making protection a plank in his platform was hatred of England.
