THE SACRED HEAD MISSING.

Tremendous Disaster Caused by the Thibet Earthquake.

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 2.—Private advices received by the steamer Empress of Japan, give fuller particulars of the earthquake disaster on the Misticrius territory, north of the Himalayas, where Shoolak, the Buddhist god incarnate, reigns supreme over the hearts of the Thibetians. Owing to the extreme remoteness of the country, information of the tremendous disaster had only just reached the coast when the Empress of Japan sailed for America. The Viceroy of Szechuan, Lou Ping Chang, who represents the civil authority of China in the distressed territory, has made a public appeal for succor and in his memorial says that the grand monasteries of Huelnyan and Kemis, the home of Buddhism, are in ruins and seven small lamaseries are buried in the wreck of the former.

HUNDREDS AMONG THE DEAD.

Eight hundred and fifty houses belonging to Native Thibetan soldiers and occupied by them and their families, met the same fate. Twenty-four Lama priests and 130 Chinese and Thibetans make up the roll of those whose bodies have been found and identified. There were also many scores of unidentified bodies, while the missing are legion. The total of fatalities will probably reach into the thousands. Upwards of 400 were mortally wounded, but were still alive when the memorial left the Viceroy, and the distress caused throughout Thibet by the shock is beyond exaggeration.

A FAMINE THREATENED.

Famine threatens the land, and the cry for bread is to all creeds and all people. The greatest misfortune of all, however, is in the minds of all devoted Buddhists, that which has befallen their sacred head, the holy Shooliak. He is among the missing from L'hassa, where the monastery of Kemis was, and the circumstances although zealously guarded by the faithful for that knowledge of it might rend asunder the entire fabric of the ancient faith, is rapidly spreading through all the eastern lands where Buddhism is the religion of the masses. The outcome is beyond calculation. The shrine is a heap of ruins and the Holy One is missing from the earth. The Lama monasteries of Huelnyan and Kemis are situated in the heart of the civilized portion of Thibet, and for ages the latter has been the seat of Buddhism proper. The monastery of Kemis was built, it is believed, about 1,000 years before Christ. Its great, gloomy pile, it was believed, would stand until the end of time. Out of the ruins there have been dug eight pure gold images of Buddha presented by the emperor Yung Ching, one hundred brazen ones, heavily gilded, and many other treasures and relics of the faith.

For 40 pounds meat—One pound salt, a quarter pound pepper, a quarter pound cayenne, 2 ounces each of sage and thyme. Pack the meat closely in unbleached muslin bags, hang in a cold place, and it will keep till warm weather.
