Very little credence, however, is given to this report. The delay is andoubtedly due to the desire of the government to await the action of the United States Senate on the Wilson bill. The government have promised the people of Canada a reasonable reduction of the tariff and before giving to the public an outline of the measure, they wish to await the action of the American Senate and govern themselves accordingly. This volicy of "looking to Washington for pointers," as it is termed by the Liberal press, will be approved by the people generally. It must be admitted that the government will be in a far better position to guard Canadian interests when they know just to what extent the people on the other side of the line are prepared to modify their tariff. The country can well afford to wait a few weeks if in the end the reduction promised meets the wishes of the people. It is further announced that the proposed bill "will it is believed be well received throughout the country although it will be largely protective." If by this is meant that the proposed modifications are are to be few and slight, the people will have much more cause for complaint than they have in the delay of the government in summoning Parliament.

The two branches of the Nova Scotia legislature are not just now working in unison. When certain of the legislative councillors were appointed, they gave a pledge to Premier Fielding to give their support to a measure abolishing the Council When the bill for abolitica came before the Upper Chamber these Councillors declined to fulfill their pledge on the ground that to support such a bill was unconstitutional. The opposition joined the government in denouncing this breach of faith, and Friday atternoon a lengthy memorial to Queen Victoria was unanimously passed regarding the abolition of the legislative council. After setting forth fully all the steps taken concerning the matter since 1878 the memorial concludes : "Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your majesty's government may be graciously pleased to recommend to the imperial parliament such an amendment to the British North American act as will enable your majesty or your majesty's favor of such policy is concurred in by at illness of only a few days. 


