LOCAL NEWS.

DEEP Snow.-Lumbermen on Richibucto and Buctouche rivers are coming out of the woods on account of the depth of snow. Before the last storm the snow was fully four feet deep. The last storm will add about 18 inches to the depth and make lumbering operations almost impossible.

AN EXTENSION WANTED .- The smelt fishing season closes on the 15th instant. Dealers. The Richibucto fishermen forwarded a petition to the Marine Department asking for an extension of the season to the 25th instant. A telegram received here la-t Saturday evening says the extension has been granted. Tides will be favorable between the 15th and 25th, and it is expected good catches will be made. Miramich fishermen have also asked for and obtained an extension.

SUPREME COURT. - The following Judgements were delivered by the Court at Fredericton last week :- Calixte Cormier v. Eustache Bourque-This was a demurrer to the plaintiff's declaration.

The declaration stated that the plaintiff had purchased from one Trarquil Bourgeois a certain piece of land in St. Paul, Kent Co., and had built a store on it and had made full preparation for putting a cellar under it, and that the defendant, knowing this, fraudulently obtained a deed from Theotime Belliveau, in whom the legal title was, and thereupon the plaintiff brought suit to obtain possession unless he would pay rent; that in consequence of the threat the plaintiff refrained from building his cellar wall whereby his vegetables were frozen; that he commenced an equity suit to set aside the fraudulent deed and thereby incurred costs which suit was settled by the defendant arrendering his title to the plaintiff. The efendants demurred on the grounds that (1) The matter complained of was not actionable. (2) That at most it was damnum absque injuria. (3) That the anatter was res judicata by the suit in equity and the settlement thereof. (4) That the damages claimed are too remote. (5) That no action will lie if the plaintiff's possession was interfered with; that what the defendant did was a mere assertion of right. The demurrer was allowed, per Palmer. Tuck and Landry, J. J.; Hanington and Barker, J. J., no part.

West v. Henry O'Leary, an appeal from the Kent County Court, was an action of trover for a safe sold by the plaintiffs doing business under the name of J. & J. Taylor at Toronto, on an agreement that the title to the safe should not pass until all notes given in payment should be paid. One of the notes not being paid, present action was brought against the defendant who had got possession of the safe from the party to whom it had been sold. Verdict for defendant. The appeal in this case was dismissed with costs per J. Palmer and Hannington, J. J.; Tuck, J., dissenting; Landry and Barker, J. J., no

-Humphrey's saw mill at Humphrey's, about 2 miles from Moncton, was burned down Friday morning about 2 o'clock. As near as can be ascertained the mill has been undergoing repairs of late. The mill was a large one and created a big blaze which was viewed by quite a number of citizens who had been aroused by an alarm of fire. There was no insurance on the building and the loss will be in the vicinity of \$15,000. No lumber was burned except a small quantity in the dry house.
