Potatoes from Seed.

There are many constantly engaged in the work of trying to find a new type of potato that will prove superior to any of those now in use. This labor is often rewarded very poorly so far as financial rewards are concerned. But in many ways, the experiments are of value, and should be conducted on a small scale wherever potatoes are raised in quantities. A small patch of land will be sufficient for this purpose, and if in the course of ten years some new ideas about potato culture are obtained, or a new type evolved, one may feel well rewarded for the work.

In order to begin the work, the seed must be obtained from vigor's parent stock. Select the finest potatoes in the field, and then by judicious crossing there is some hope of improving upon the quality of these types. Plant the potatoes in good soil, as the experiment garden always should be, and when the seed balls are ripe in the fall of the year, they should be gathered and exposed to the sun for a few days. Then squeeze them into water, and

the good seeds will quickly raise to the surface. Take these off very carefully separating them from all foreign substances and chafe. After taking from the water they should be dried in the sun or by the stove, and then stowed away in paper bags until spring.

Work should begin early on the experiment ground. Plow, harrow, and pulverize the soil thoroughly, add plenty of rich manure to it. It is even better to prepare a hot bed for the seeds and get them started first, transplanting them to the open ground later. They should be sowed thinly in rows or hills, and then as they grow, thin them out. One or two stalks in each hill, two feet apart, is about the right closeness. Now as the potatoes grow, they must be watched and notes taken of them. Have a stick in each hill with a label on it giving the number of the potato plant. Any information, such as growth, time of ripening and yield, should be jotted down in a book opposite the number of the plant. Anything unusual in the growth of the plant requires notice, also the amount of manure used, kind and nature of the soil.

This record of the potatoes must extend over four or five years. This continuous record is valuable as showing the average quality of any particular plant. It will be found that some of the plants will have a wonderful record the first year, but they will die out and prove worthless. Others will begin small and increase as the years go by.

In the fall the tubers should be dug, selecting only the finest hills on the ground for a continuation of the experiment. Place these tubers in separate boxes, numbered and labelled. They should be used for seed the next spring. At the end of five years the records of the potatoes will tell whether any improvements have been made. Often a new variety that is specially adapted to the particular soil will be discovered and then the work will be well repaid. It is only by such slow progress and careful observation that one ever makes a success in experimenting with potatoes.—[Exchange.]

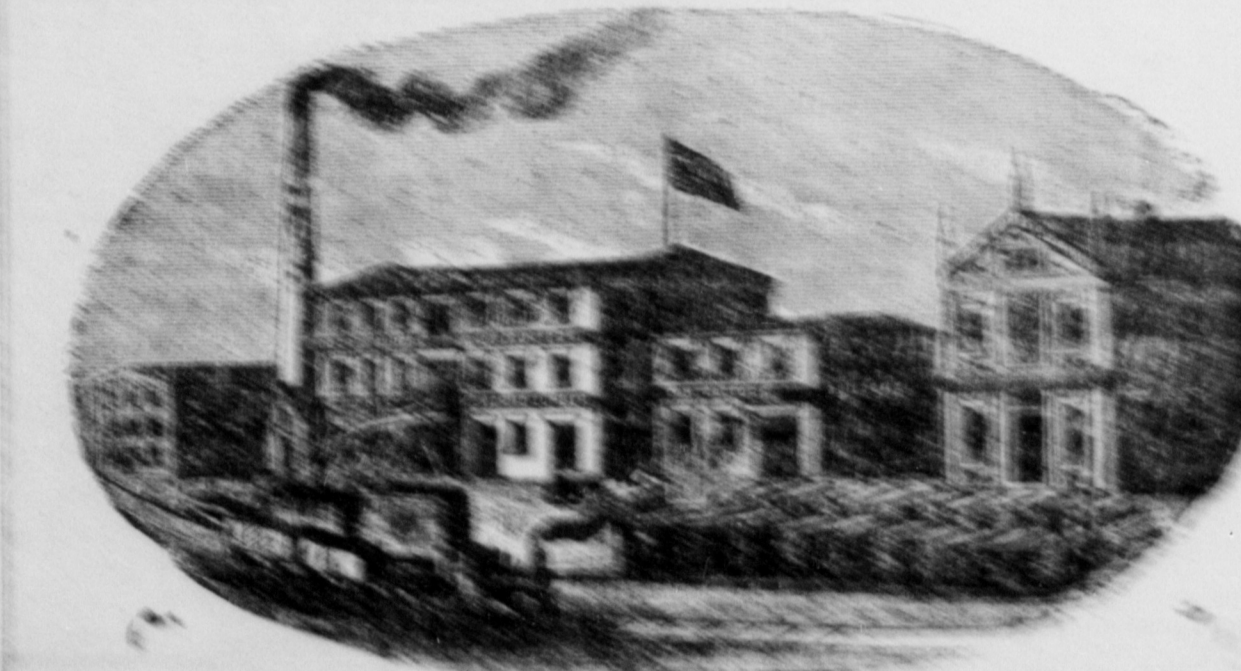
