Is Venus Inhabited.
It will be remembered, says the Youth's Companion, that about two years ago the famous Italian astronomer, Schiaparelli, announced that he had discovered that Venus, which is a world very slightly smaller than ours, makes only one turn on its axis in going once around the sun. It would follow from this that upon Venus there is no succession of days and nights, as upon the earth, but that perpetual day reigns upon one side of the planet and perpetual night upon the other. In other words, if Schiaparelli is right, Venus always presents the same face to the sun, just as the moon forever turns the same hemisphere towards the earth.

The inhabitants on the sunward side of Venus, then—if there be any—never see the sun set, while the inhabitants of the other side, never see the sun at all unless they visit the opposite hemisphere of their globe.

Of course, no one knows whether there are inhabitants upon Venus or not, but we know that Venus has an atmosphere, and that in its atmosphere water vapor exists and clouds float, and that upon the surface of the planet the force of gravitation is not very different from that which it manifests on the surface of the earth. Accordingly there are some reasons to be urged in behalf of the opinion that Venus may be an inhabited world.

But if one-half of Venus be buried in endless night while the other half lies glaring beneath a never setting sun, it is evident that the inhabitants of that planet must have experiences that would be most strange and trying to us. So the question whether Venus really does rotate on its axis only once in 225 days, the period of the revolution around the sun, derives an added interest from the consideration that the planet possibly has inhabitants.

The older observations indicated that Venus rotated in between 23 and 24 hours giving it days and nights about equal to those of the earth. In order to settle the question it has recently been proposed to apply the spectroscope. It is known that in the spectrum of a celestial body which is rapidly approaching the earth the spectroscopic lines are shifted towards the blue, while in the spectrum of a fast retreating body the lines are shifted towards the red.

This principle has been used in measuring the rate of the sun's rotation. The lines are shifted towards the blue on the eastern and towards the red on western edge of the sun, and by measuring the amount of shifting the rate of rotation is found. It is easy to see that the same method may be applied to find out how fast Venus revolves on its axis.

Everyone who watches the glorious evening star growing brighter and brighter in the sunset sky during the coming months will certainly be eager to hear the latest news from the astronomers who are trying to find out whether Venus has successive days and nights like the earth or has only a day side and a night side.

Quinine in India.

The average duration of life in India is twenty-four years, as against nearly forty-four years in England. The main cause of the difference is the prevalence in India of malarial fevers. Quinine is the specific for malaria, and the government of India determined thirty years ago to make it cheap and abundant. To that end it established cinchona plantations, which passed through many vicissitudes, and have at length so far succeeded as to make it possible to offer the population Bengal quinine put up in five-grain doses at one pie (a farthing) a dose. The quinine put up in five-grain packets, stamped with the royal arms, is sold at all the post offices in Bengal, and the demand for it, increasing month by month, in the month of September reached one hundred and twenty thousand packets. This amount is in addition to what is served out to crowds of fever patients by the village and district dispensaries, and represents, says a correspondent, only a small proportion of the relief which before long will be rendered available to the population of India as a whole.
