A Remarkable Case.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—A notable loss-of-memory case, involving a confusion of personality, is engaging the attention of scientists. A lady who was sitting on the promenade at Brighton found herself unable to tell her name, address or anything connected with her life. She said that she had felt something break inside of her head. The authorities, not being able to find out anything about her, had her sent to the workhouse. There was not a single mark on her clothing, letters, or anything else that would assist in the discovery of her identity. She conversed as an educated woman on the things around her, and spoke in a similar manner to the doctor who examined her, but her mind was an absolute blank as far as the past was concerned. The woman was described widely and her case was discussed at length by the newspapers. Her husband, who is a civil engineer in London, turned up last night, and was recognized by her. She made no reply, left her home a week ago. She has no idea of how she went to Brighton. The doctors say that while she was struggling to remember her name she often said it was Friday. Then she said that it could not be that. She signed her letters "Mrs. Anybody."

—The portwardens held a survey of the Norwegian bark Stjernen, Captain Heltum, which grounded on the South Beach while endeavoring to leave port last week. They found her in a bad state and she will be sold together with the cargo (lumber) for the benefit of all concerned on Saturday next at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

—The remains of Mrs. James relict of the late James Alexander James, of Richibucto, and mother of H. H. James of Buctouche, who died at New York on Friday, were brought on for interment. The funeral took place from the K. N. R. depot immediately after the arrival of the train on Tuesday. The interment took place in the Union Cemetery, the service being conducted by the Rev. J. S. Allen. The deceased lady who was 73 years of age, was beloved by all who knew her.

A City at the Bottom of the Sea.

The city authorities of Rovigno, on the peninsula of Istria, in the Adriatic Sea, have discovered a little south of the peninsula the ruins of a large town at the bottom of the sea. It had been observed for years that fishermen's nets were sometimes entangled in what appeared to be masses of masonry, of which fragments were brought up from the sea bed. Then a diver declared that he had seen streets and walls below the water, and so the authorities of the Rovigno decided to investigate. They sent down a diver, who at the depth of 80 feet, found himself surrounded at the bottom of the sea by ruined walls.

Continuing his explorations he traced the line of walls and was able to distinguish how the streets were laid out. He did not see any doors or windows for they were hidden by masses of seaweed and incrustations. He traced the masonry for distance of a hundred feet and there he had to stop for his diving cord did not permit him to go further. He had proved beyond a doubt that he had found the ruins of a once inhabited town, which through some catastrophe, had been covered by the sea. It is probable these are the ruins of the lost town of Cissa, upon the island of that name mentioned by Pliny, the elder.

Saved From Wreckers.

OTTAWA, Sept. 28.—When the Dominion government learned that the Dominion liner Mariposa was stranded at Port Amour on the Labrador coast, twelve miles from Newfoundland, information was at once cabled to the home office in Great Britain. Protection was asked against the pirates of Newfoundland, who had wrought such havoc with the steamer Mexico. Instructions were at once sent from the

admiralty office in London to H. M. S. Buzzard, at St. John's, Nfld., setting forth the facts of the case with instructions to proceed to the scene of the wreck. The Buzzard proceeded to the Straits and reached there just in time to thwart the land pirates who were preparing to make a descent upon the ship for the purpose of plundering her, but they beat a hasty retreat on the approach of the warship. Captain Cave and a few of the crew that remained were allowed to proceed with the work of getting the cattle and sheep ashore assisted by the blue jackets.

A Cheerful View.

The following story is told of a correspondent who has recently returned from a trip to the far west of the United States: Two men who had been sitting together in the seat near the door of a railway car became engaged in an animated controversy and their loud voices attracted the attention of all the other passengers.
