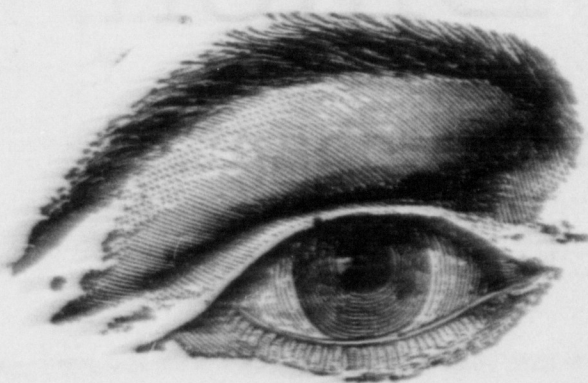

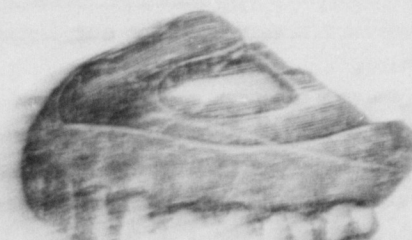

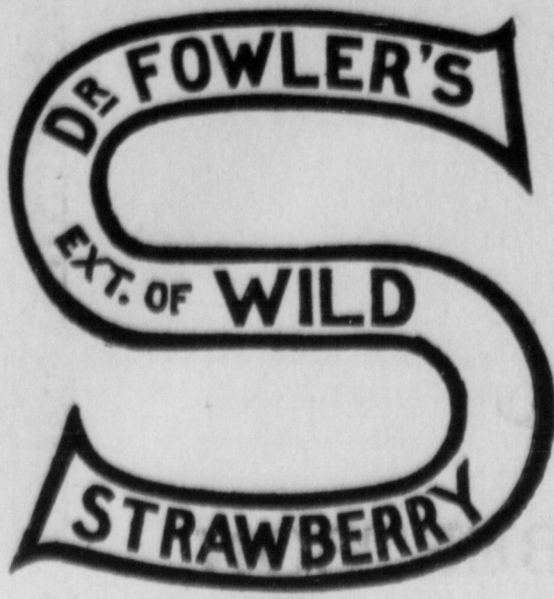

THE QUEEN'S PICTURE.

Frederick Bell-Smith, of Toronto. Gains an Opportunity Sought by all Great Portrait Painters.

Mr. Frederick Bell-Smith, of Toronto, is the envied of portrait painters on both sides of the Atlantic. He has just completed a portrait of Her Majesty Queen Victoria from the life.

The Canadian Government wished to place in the National Gallery at Ottawa a large picture reproducing the scene at Windsor Castle, when the Queen placed a wreath on the coffin of Sir John Thompson, the eminent Canadian statesman, whose sudden death took place as he was on his way to Windsor Castle.

It was of the utmost importance that the portraits of all who witnessed the ceremony should be made from life.

A personal sitting from the Queen is royal favour the greatest painter would give much to obtain, but the favour is seldom granted. Mr. Bell-Smith was fortunate in having the support of Lord Lorne and Princess Louise, who founded the Canadian Academy in 1880. It was the Princess who made all the arrangements and told Mr. Bell-Smith that the Queen was particularly pleased to give the sitting to a Canadian artist and was most anxious that he should have every facility, as she desired to show a further mark of her esteem for the Canadians.

The lucky Canadian artist arrived at Windsor Castle on July 5 last, accompanied by two photographers and was accorded one hour sitting by Her Majesty. Mr. Bell-Smith was treated 'like a prince,' the Princess Louise doing all in her power to facilitate his work. Her majesty was most gracious and apologized to the artist for having kept him waiting a few minutes. Before the Queen appeared in the White Drawing Room, where the sitting was made, she sent word by the Princess Louise to ask whether she should wear a bonnet. The artist was satisfied with the plain bonnet. Directly afterwards the Queen entered the room, supporting herself with a cane, her left hand resting on the arm of her Indian secretary the Munshi. Mr. Bell-Smith will never forget the scene. The magnificent East Indian, tall, dignified, with embroidered robe, turban, jewels and high caste to the finger tips, leading in an aged, almost helpless woman, his Queen, scarcely five feet in height, dressed all in black. The sitting resulted in one of the finest portraits of Her Majesty ever painted and will be a source of pride to all Canadians who have the welfare of our national gallery at heart. Besides the portrait of Her Majesty Mr. Bell-Smith made sketches and paintings from personal sittings given him by the Princess Beatrice, Miss McNeill, Hon. Francis Drummond, Hon. Judith Harford, Col. Lord Edward Pelham Clinton, Lord Hawkesbury, Sir Henry Ponsonby, Lieut.-Col. Sir Fleetwood Edwards, Sir John McNeill, Lieut.-Col. the Hon. Wm. Carrington, Col. John Clark, Sir James Reid, Mr. Murther, Lieut.-Col. Holmes, Munshi Hafiz Abdul Karim (the Queen's Indian secretary), Sir Charles Tupper, the Rev. Father Longinotto and Mrs. Sandford and daughters.

He Can Fly At Last.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Sept. 5.—Inventor A. F. Cooley of Hornesville came here yesterday and gave another exhibit of his flying machine, or air-ship. He has tried it twice before here and failed. This time he was successful, though only after a second attempt. The exhibition was given in Genesee Valley Park, and was witnessed by thousands. The first time the ship went up it came down with disastrous results, smashing some of the rigging. After a delay of a couple of hours it was started upward again. The ship started up gracefully, rising to the height of three hundred feet, as high as the ropes would let it go, and it was all that the combined strength of the men could do to hold it. Its descent was as graceful, coming down gracefully and settling about five hundred feet from where it started. The ship was only a model, the original being much larger and having a motor by which it is raised from the ground, and also having accommodation for six persons.
