As two young ladies were on their way to the village they were attacked by a huge black pig.

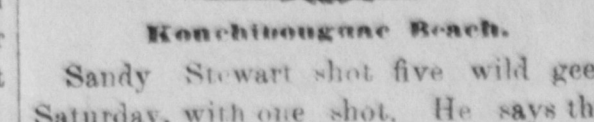
Hugh Stewart has returned home from Campbellton, much to the joy of the ladies.

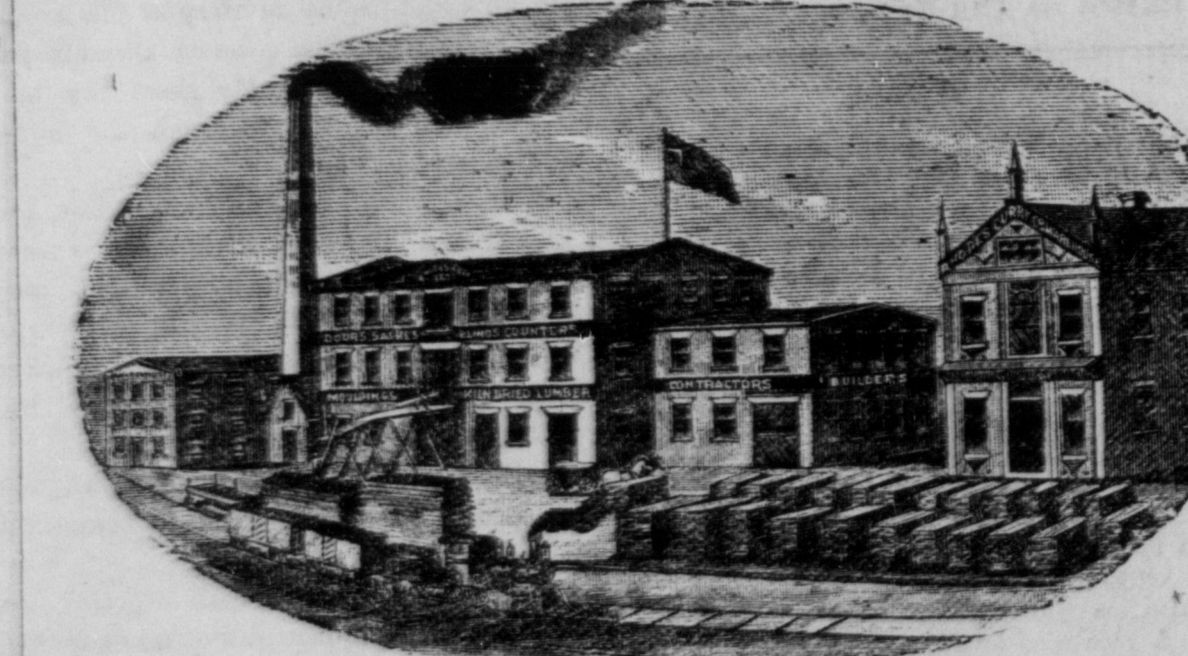
