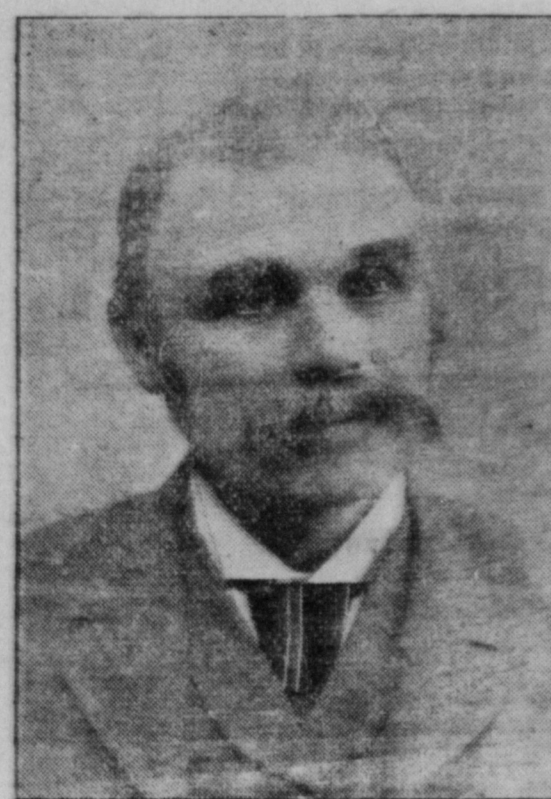




**SMELT FISHING AT BUCTOUCHE.**—The smelt fishermen of Buctouche, the greatest smelt fishing centre in the world have been reaping a rich harvest since the season opened on Monday last. This little fish, which is much demanded by Americans as well as Canadians, is very plentiful this year and the catches at different points have been very large. On Monday the large buyers, the Messrs. Loggie and Irving paid out \$2500 at Buctouche. On Tuesday almost if not quite a large amount was scattered among the fishermen. About 60 tons have so far been shipped over the Moncton & Buctouche railway for the American market, some 20 tons being shipped yesterday and 25 tons on Thursday. A few of the fishermen have realized as much as \$100 per day. The day's catches in some instances have been enormous. Three fishermen had the misfortune to lose nets, so great was the run of fish. A. G. Tyng, representing a New York firm, the Messrs. Loggie and Irving are the principal buyers.—Times, 7th.



The Late John W. Harnett.

The last rites of the Roman Catholic Church, were performed on the remains of John W. Harnett, at St. Aloysius church, Richibucto, on the 4th inst. Father McAulay, of Chatham, uncle of the deceased celebrated the Mass of Requiem; Fathers Bannon and LeBlanc in the Sanctuary. Father McAulay feelingly referred to the good, kind, generous qualities of the deceased. "You know them," he said, "better than I can tell you. As boys brought up together the community knew us, and his record of years carry him." His nice discourse on death, and the comparative view taken of it; his easy, quiet, though forcible eloquence, seemed short, when he ended off with the words, "Have pity on me, have pity on me, at least you, my friends, because the hand of the Lord has touched me;" these words with a sorrowful heart ended the obsequies of Mr. Harnett. Let the sod that covers him grow green—green by nature, and be always fresh and bright is the wish of the writer.

Many fishermen up river were using rafts to fish from, there being no ice, and nearly every net was carried away, but they were subsequently recovered, some of them in a badly damaged state. At one place no less than ten nets were piled up on the shore. About five inches of snow fell.

—A terrific gale prevailed throughout England and off the coast Thursday morning. Outward bound vessels were driven back to the ports from which they had sailed and other sailings were postponed. All outdoor work in the shipyards at Bristol was suspended owing to the violence of the gale. Many accidents occurred in London through falling chimneys, masonry, signs, shutters, etc. The telegraph wires in the north of England were all prostrated.

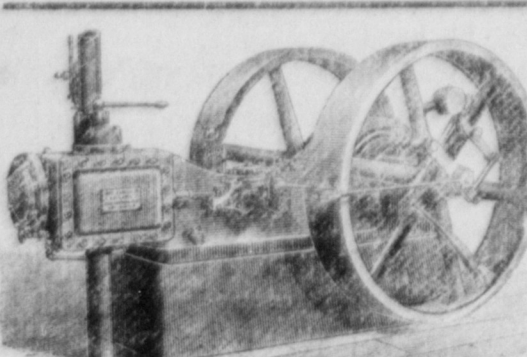

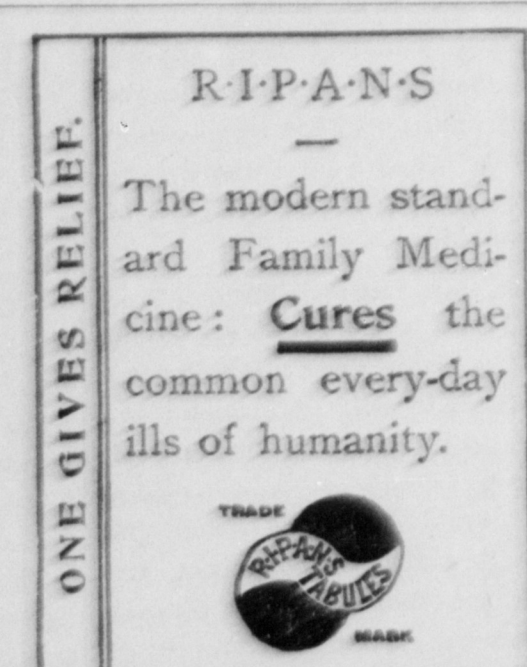
