Sunday Schools.

The Sunday school in Bass River, Wm. Marshall, Supt., is the third largest in the County, being only about 55 scholars behind the largest.

Mr. Marshall is starting Home Study classes to begin the first of the New Year. He secured the cards from Timothy Hough, Syracuse, New York. The pledges are 20c. per 100 and the attendance cards same price. There is space for 4 names on each card. Fifty cards of each kind would cost 25 cents and would be sufficient to record 200 names for 3 months, or 100 names for 6 months or 50 names for 12 months. In cases where the pledge cards are signed for the whole year, which is the best way, fewer pledge cards would do. But the attendance cards are to be circulated quarterly.

Full directions go with the cards secured from Timothy Hough—send cash and ask for directions. Each teacher can have a few families assigned to him or her. She (for it will probably be a woman) can distribute lesson sheets or quarterlies (preferable) at the beginning of each quarter—at least ten days before the new quarter begins. Any person who takes the "Evangelist" can learn all about the Home Department there. It is meant to enlist all, who do not attend the Sunday school, in the study of the lessons. There are many who cannot attend and many who will not. Many of these may be asked to study the Bible at home. And many will take immediate hold of this if asked. Can't your whole district join these classes? Can't your teachers canvass every house? It will be no harm to try. Some will do great things this winter in this line.

Every Supt. in the County received samples of Hough's cards, and every teacher can form a class. Conduct the main school all winter. Don't let it close. But don't forget the Home Classes for many can't get to the main school.

Every minister who simply drops a card to Timothy Hough with a request can find all about the Home Department. Wide-awake churches and Sunday schools are taking a solid hold of this work. It is meeting a want that has long been felt. Drop me a card if you intend forming a class. Any teacher can start one herself. Drop me a card and let me know. It will stimulate others.

THE WIDE, WIDE WORLD.

Cardinal Persico, Secretary General of the Propaganda, is dead, aged 72.

Theodore Durant, the murderer of two young women in a church at San Francisco, has been denied a new trial. He will appeal to the Supreme Court.

Peter Conlon, who on the retirement of Thomas Brynes was made acting chief of the police of New York, has been appointed chief by the Police Commissioners.

Despatches from Canton say that a serious attempt was under consideration recently to seize the city of Canton and proclaim an independent Government.

Mr. Ives, Controller of Trade and Commerce, in an interview in Montreal yesterday, said that the vacancy in the Montreal Custom House will be filled before the dawn of the new year.

Messrs. Robert Reford & Co., agents for the Donaldson Line, have decided to continue their winter service between St. John, N. B., and Glasgow. The passenger steamer will be the Warwick, which sails from Glasgow on the 21st, and from St. John on January 9th.

A 17-year-old husband was divorced from a 16-year-old wife in San Francisco last week. The husband was a messenger boy.

A boy of 14 and a girl of 11 were married in Johnson county, Georgia, the other day. The parents of the children interposed no objection to the marriage.

Lieutenant Feijo, of the Spanish army in Cuba, has been sentenced to imprisonment for life for surrendering Fort Paya to the insurgents without a proper defence.

A party of American capitalists and hotel men are, it is said, anxious to purchase the Windsor hotel, of Montreal and have made an informal offer to the stockholders.

During the 900 years that the Peking Gazette has been in existence, 1,800 of its editors have had their heads taken off for having exceeded instructions, according to Le Figaro.

Hon. Amor De Cosmos, formerly plain "Bill Smith," of mining days, and afterwards ex-Premier of British Columbia and now one of the four richest men of that province, has been adjudged insane.

Representations have been made to the Comptroller of Customs, on behalf of English capitalists, looking towards the establishment in Canada of the manufacture of gin. Our supply of this beverage, at present, comes almost entirely from Holland. The total importation last year was 436,951 gallons, of which 400,000

came from the land of dykes. The obstacle in the way of establishing the business in Canada is the legislative restriction placed upon it. If manufactured in this country, the article must be two years old, before offered for sale, but no time limit is fixed for the imported article. It was urged upon the Comptroller of Customs, to day, that, for a few years, the two-year clause should be suspended, in regards gin in order that the foreign article might eventually be superseded by the product of Canadian distilleries, made under Government supervision. No answer was given to the suggestions, as the matter is one with which Parliament alone can deal.

Those who have been expecting a great reduction in the prices of bicycles, next year, may be disappointed, so far as the standard makes are concerned. So far the price lists that have been submitted to the Department of Customs maintain the rates very nearly up to those which were admitted last year. The discounts off the catalogue price, which were allowed last year, for the purpose of valuing for duty, will not be materially altered. The department has been making a very full enquiry into the prices of the different wheels in the country of production, and acts with the amplest information in its possession.

For the third time in five years the dynamite house of the Ottawa Powder Co. exploded Saturday. One man has died from his injuries.

H. Hatma or Harman, who lived alone near McAdam, has disappeared and it is supposed he wandered into the woods and perished.

In a railway accident on the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad on Sunday, an engineer and two brakemen were killed.

Sampson, Kennedy & Co., one of Toronto's big dry goods houses, has suspended. Liabilities will approach a million dollars. The Mayor of Toronto, Mr. Kennedy, is a member of this firm.

William Becker, a young moulder, saved the life of a stranger near Buffalo on Thursday night by pushing him off the railroad track in time to prevent him being run over. In doing so Becker fell and lost his leg, and the stranger went on his way without even saying "Thank you" to his preserver.

London, Dec. 7.—What information is obtainable and the nature of the consular reports that are reaching the foreign office confirm the worst fears of the destruction of the Armenians. Within the area from Trebizond southward to Van, and from Alexandrie northward to Kara Hissar, whole Christian towns and villages have been pillaged and burned and their inhabitants massacred. The correspondent of the Speaker, the paper which first gave publicity to the Armenian outrages, is now known to have close relations with the consulates in Constantinople, and from information derived from there he estimates that not less than 500,000 persons have either been killed or are now dying of starvation beyond the chance of timely relief. The ambassadors have advised the Porte to permit the Red Cross societies to undertake the relief of the destitute people, but the presence of hundreds of Red Cross agents would reveal the horrors that the Porte must conceal.

Advices received from Harpoot show that three Protestant pastors, Rev. Mr. Tanzarian, at Ichnab; Rev. Mr. Kirkor at Kos; Rev. Mr. Atlassian and wife, a Hesenik, have been murdered for refusing to abjure the faith and embrace Islamism. The Sultan has decided to consent to each of the powers having a second guardship at Constantinople.
