A CALL FOR ASSISTANCE.—Buctouche, N. B., Sept. 28th, 1895. The public is already aware that a Relief Committee has been appointed to look after the sufferers by the hail storm of the 21st August last, which ruined the crops in large sections of the parishes of Wellington and St. Mary in the County of Kent, N. 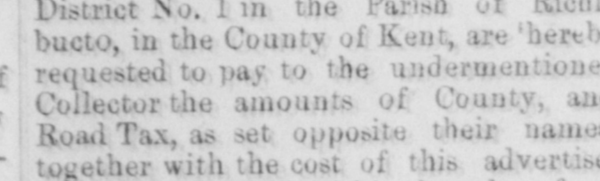
