OYSTER FISHERMAN DROWNED.—During the heavy blow on Friday last, an oyster fisherman named Anoine Casey, of Cocagne, was drowned about a mile above Kingston bridge. Casey and two companions were proceeding up the river in their boat when it upset, precipitating the occupants into the water. Mr. G. Palmer who witnessed the accident from the shore secured an old dugout and paddled out to their rescue. Casey sank before Mr. Palmer could reach them. The survivors were rescued with great difficulty. Mr. Palmer's heroic action in risking his life to save the drowning men is deserving of recognition at the hands of the Humane Society. The body was recovered next day and taken to Cocagne for burial. Casey, who was 36 years old, leaves a wife and five children.

British Vessel Fired Upon and Owner Killed.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—The Herald has the following from Barbados, W. I.: Colonists have been startled by the announcement that a commander named Filbert on board a Venezuelan guarda costa has shot down Thomas Garcia, owner of the British schooner Myosotis, on board that vessel, while on the voyage from Port of Spain, Trinidad, in a most unprovoked manner.

It is generally believed the murder of Mr. Garcia is a grave misfortune to Venezuela, considering the present relations between the two countries, as it will give England an undoubted advantage in dealing with Gen. Crespo and his government. England will certainly demand satisfaction for this and other unwarranted outrages on her shipping. It has been generally conceded in the West Indies that Venezuela was endeavoring to force the hand of Great Britain on the boundary question, but it is to-day quite as generally admitted that the murder of Mr. Garcia is the greatest blunder that has yet been perpetrated by Venezuela in her quarrel with England. The circumstances connected with the death of Mr. Garcia are these: The Myosotis, a British schooner, was on the voyage from Port of Spain, Trinidad, to the Island of Margarita. Mr. Garcia was on board the vessel and had made the better part of the voyage when they observed a Venezuelan guarda costa in pursuit of them. The gunboat appeared to be under full steam, as she rapidly gained on the sailing ship. Benefiting by former experience for the Myosotis had on a former voyage been captured by a Venezuelan revenue cutter—the British ensign was run to the masthead. The guarda costa continued to approach, and, when well up with the Myosotis, and within close range, commander Filbert opened fire upon the vessel. Mr. Garcia, who was on deck at the time, was shot dead, and the others only saved themselves by throwing themselves flat upon the deck. The

schooner was brought to and the guarda costa at once came alongside, and took the schooner with its dead owner and frightened crew on board in tow and proceeded to Capupano. Here the vessel was rummaged from stem to stern, and as there was no contraband goods found on board was liberated."

The Verdict Against Durant in San Francisco. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 1.—The Durant case went to the jury at 3.25 p. m. Only one ballot was taken, and Durant was found guilty of murder in the first degree. The jury were out but twenty minutes and returned a verdict without any recommendation for mercy. The punishment was fixed at death. This trial was for the murder of Blanche Lamont on July 22nd last. Durant is yet to be tried for the murder of Minnie Williams. When the jury returned with the verdict the scene in the court room baffles description. Men cheered the decision, while women wept hysterically. Durant made a half attempt to rise to his feet, but before he was able to do so his mother, with half a sigh, half a moan, threw her arms around his neck, and sank into her chair. Durant seemingly forgot his keen position for the time being and with his arms around his mother's neck was doing his best to console her. When she left the room he was taken back to his cell, apparently the most unconcerned person in the vast assemblage.
