GENERAL NEWS.

Information has been received at Ottawa that the New Zealand Legislature has rejected the proposed treaty with Canada.

Thomas Nixon, recently married to a Yar-mouth girl, was on Friday sentenced to fifteen days in jail for stealing a dress. He tried to sell it to buy food for his wife.

The Masons of Mississippi have made a rule that "no Mason, either as principal, agent, employe, or in any other capacity, shall sell intoxicating liquors to be used as a beverage, and the penalty thereof shall be expulsion."

Ex-Chief of Police Page, of St. Cune-gonde, Que., and Cyrille Moquina, a butcher, were burned to death in a government dredge in the Lachine canal Saturday night.

Fire in a sweat shop on Pelham street, New York, on Sunday, was the cause of the loss of three lives, and it is feared that more bodies may be in the ruins.

Thomas McLaughlin, who shot and killed his mother in Olneyville, R. I., on Thursday night and subsequently shot himself, died on Saturday night.

Steamer Northumberland, now running to P. E. Island from Shediac, will be run during the winter between Palm Beach, Florida and Nassau, in the Bahamas.

There is a prospect that New York capitalists will soon open up the St. Stephen Nickel mines.

Many provincialists going to the Maine woods have been turned back at the border because of the alien labor law.

The Banque du Peuple, which suspended three months ago, opened again Monday morning, and a crowd was around all morning, drawing 25 per cent. of their deposits as promised them.

The London Daily News says the British consul at Erzerum reports that the Turkish soldiers behave very well, preventing mobs from attacking the Armenians.

Death came to Frederick Thompson, of San Francisco, in a strange place. He was sitting in a bootblack's chair, on one of the main streets of the city, having his shoes shined, when heart disease killed him.

At Eagle, W. Va., Ervin Hartley met his sweetheart, Bettier Shields, with whom he had quarreled, and fired several shots from a revolver at her. Only one took effect and that only grazed the girl's neck.

Fletcher Denley, the young man who was accidentally shot in the abdomen on Thursday last at St. Andrews, by a companion, named Williamson, while firing at a mark, died Monday morning, after suffering untold agony.

The difficulty respecting the missionaries in Sassoun has been settled. The governor of Moosh has assured British Vice-Consul Hampson that he will assume all responsibility for their safety.

John D. Rockefeller has made another magnificent gift to the University of Chicago. His latest act of munificence, the unconditional presentation of \$1,000,000 available on January 1 next and the gift of \$2,000,000 conditional on raising the same amount, was made known to the students on Saturday.

On Monday last V. G. Metzgar shot down Marshal Britton at Uniontown, Ala., who died. Saturday night Frank Metzgar an older brother, jumped into a well and broke his neck, and a grown sister of Metzgar is so critically ill as a result that it is feared she will not recover.

Mr. J. Israel Tarte gave instructions to his lawyers to commence legal proceedings for fifty thousand dollars damages against the Toronto World on account of a despatch from Montreal published in that journal, in which certain charges were made against him.

The Miramichi corporation drive, containing about 15 or 20 million feet of lumber, has got safely into the South West boom.

A bicycle rider was arrested in New York a few days since, under the law forbidding Sunday labour, for mending a

puncture in his wheel on the first day of the week. The magistrate ruled that the mending of a puncture in a bicycle tire on Sunday, if the accident occurred on that day, was a work of necessity.

Dennis Sauntry, of Williamstown, Miramichi, was killed on Thursday afternoon last by a load of hay falling over on him. He was buried beneath the hay and is said to have been smothered thereby.
