Local Politics of N. B.

BUCTOUCHE, Nov. 5.- I ask the readers of THE REVIEW to follow me a few minutes in a glance at the local politics of our province as they appear after the smoke of battle has cleared away. The politics of our province now can neither be called liberal nor conservative, neither the government or opposition being one nor the other or even a coalition. The majority of the members of the house are opportunists. Mr. Blair seized the opportunity when it presented to become premier. Mr. LaBillois saw his opportunity and accepted it with becoming grace. Messrs. Stockton and Alward saw that they could not obtain a portfolio as long as the provincial secretaryship was already held by a city member. They would sooner be leaders in the opposition than simply private members of the government party, therefore they seized the opportunity of the Ritchie appointment to become leaders.

The Bathurst school troubles began and pear to be under Catholic influence and the Orangemen of York elected them to ornament the house. Mr. Fowler, of Kings, tried the same thing but did not succeed, but still brought himself so prominently before Mr. Blair's gaze that he was given a place upon the government ticket and thus he obtained his seat. Dr. Alward and Dr. Stockton lost very little time in making proposals to the elected members which would have been satisfactory only Mr. Blair seized the opportunity to offer better propositions and thus obtained their support, and Mr. Tweedie, having seized the opportunity is now a member of that government he was once elected to defeat and still he has had his grievances redressed. Who can we not touch upon and not see the opportunist in all his actions?

Be they what they may, they either follow the dictatorship of the premier or they form into small sections and surround him, and still he seems to be the one man in the whole political arena, the rest are children pleased with the play toys or delighted with the glistening bubble. Some ask why Blair can't be defeated, my answer is that he tries to please all sections at any sacrifice to the province, hence the opposition in opposing him displeased those sections Mr. Blair himself pleased. In short Mr. Blair being determined to remain in power stops at nothing and hence presents an invulnerable front to the enemy. If he was to appeal to the country to-morrow on any important issue and sustained defeat, to-morrow night he would be the leader of the other side of the issue and make the opposition the leaders of that very issue upon which he himself was defeated only a few hours previously.
