**REPLEVIN SUIT.**—Sheriff Leger impanelled a jury Monday to try out the question of right of property in the suit of James McEachran vs. George W. Robertson. This action was brought to recover the cargo of lumber of the schooner British Eagle wrecked at the mouth of the Richibucto harbour last September. The captain, in the first place, endeavored to find a schooner to reship, but failed, and afterwards communicated with the plaintiff with a view of getting him to take the cargo and pay the expenses. The plaintiff, however, under a misapprehension of his rights, denied ownership and refused to have anything to do with the matter. The cargo was then sold at public auction and purchased by defendant. Plaintiff afterwards claimed he had been mistaken in his statement regarding ownership and asked to have the property delivered to him, but refused to pay the expenses connected with the wreck and saving of the cargo. The jury found the right of property in defendant until payment of all these expenses. Geo. V. McInerney for plaintiff and Wm. D. Carter for defendant.

—Fire engine No. 1, which had been put on runners for the winter, was changed back to the wheels on Saturday so as to be in readiness in case of fire.

—Mr. Jas. L. Hutchinson will conduct an auction sale at the residence of Mr. D. Young, Galloway, on Saturday, 28th inst. For particulars see posters.

—Three of the Moncton school teacher have resigned—Miss Fawcett, Miss M. Bleakney and Miss Fillmore. The trustees have engaged Misses Lea, McLaren and Cruise.

—The fancy sale and tea in the temperance hall, on Thursday evening was well attended. About seventy-three dollars were realized. The ladies in charge—notably Mrs. W. E. Forbes, Miss Allan and Miss Beers—are to be congratulated on the success of the affair.

—A short time ago Mrs. Robert Ferguson, of Main River, got a slight scratch on her hand. Blood poisoning set in, and her arm was amputated at the elbow on Friday last by Doctors Ferguson and Doherty. The patient is doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances.

—Some people have been making a count, and find that not one of the State governors in the United States is a Roman Catholic. There are no Roman Catholics in the cabinet, and very few in the Senate, none in the Supreme Court, and there never has been one in the White House.

—The Superior School at Bass River, Mr and Mrs G. A. Coates, teachers—held its examination Friday, 20th inst. Quite a number of visitors were present. The pupils were examined in reading, arithmetic, geography and Latin and acquitted themselves well. A school concert was also given in the hall on Saturday night to a good sized audience which thoroughly enjoyed the programme.

—The remarkably mild weather of the past week paralyzed the smelt trade. Many of the fishermen had to remove their nets and shanties to a place of safety as the ice had become very bad. The first few days of the thaw large quantities of fish were taken, but as they could not be frozen, the fishermen with few exceptions ceased fishing. A good deal of the fish now on the ice will probably be lost. There are upwards of two hundred tons in the market about half of which is stored in the freezers.

—Mr. Wm. Marshall, Bass River, has organized three Home Study Classes with a membership of 40. The visitors are Misses May Clark, Bessie Marshall, and Belle Murphy. —Application was made for review by H. H. James before Judge Wells at Moncton, on Friday, in the matter of Jonathan Glendenning vs. Walter Foster tried before Justice Caie, at Richibucto, on Nov. 25th last. This was an action on account and a verdict found for the plaintiff below. Summons granted returnable January 3rd next. The review of Andrew McIntosh vs. George McKay was also argued. This was an action on a promissory note tried before Justice Bailey at Harcourt on the fifth day of November last and a verdict found for the pliff. The ground for review was, among others, taken that there was no proof as required. New trial granted. E. Albert Reilly for pliff., and H. H. James for deft.

This suit was brought for an injunction to prevent defendant from selling under a power of sale in a mortgage held by him on plaintiff's farm and for the redemption of the premises. Girvan claimed \$310.00 under his mortgage and Thomas claimed that several payments had been made which were not credited. The Judge in Equity referred the matter to a Referee to take an account and he found a balance of \$230 due on the mortgage. Wm. D. Carter solicitor for plaintiff and C. J. Sayre for defendant.

—Dr. Robert Jardine was recently appointed assistant physician to the Maternity Hospital, Glasgow, Scotland. There were several candidates for the position. He is a graduate of the University of Edinburgh, and also holds the diploma of the Royal College of Surgeons of England and the Fellowship of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow. In 1886 he took the M. B. and C. M. of Edinburgh with first-class honors in the midwifery class, and in the same year the membership of the Royal College of Surgeons of England. In 1889 he received his M. D. for a thesis on a midwifery subject, which was commended for its excellence. In the present year he passed the examination, and was enrolled a Fellow of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow.

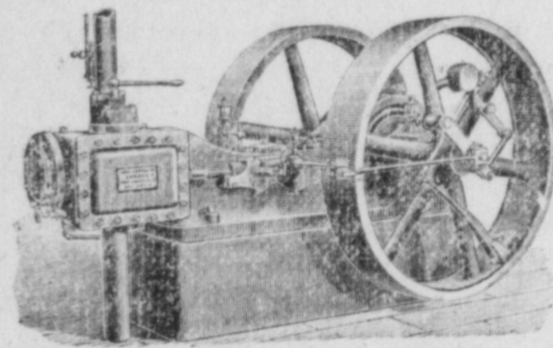
