**Divorces In The East.**

In Burmah when a couple desire a divorce the first step is a general summoning of the family relations of both sides, who commence proceedings with a view to an amiable settlement. This however seldom takes place. Then the patriarchs of the village are called in, and they proceed as follows: They take two candles, wax if possible, but generally rushlights, and apportion one to the husband and the other to the wife. The candles are then placed upon the table, if there is one, and on the floor if there is not, and lighted. Great care is taken that neither is in any draught likely to interfere with or expedite combustion. Then the husband, wife and relatives sit round to wait and watch. If the husband's candle burns out first, he and all his relatives walk out of the door and leave the wife in possession of the house and all the chattels. If the wife's candle goes out first, she and her relatives depart. The victor pays a small fee to the candle providing patriarchs, and the divorce is complete. In Madagascar a husband can divorce his wife for the most trivial offence by giving her a piece of money before witnesses and saying: "I thank you, madam" In Japan the couple simply proceed to the nearest temple, each wearing a blue scarf across the left shoulder and knotted under the right arm. They bow thrice before the altar, unfasten their scarfs and leave the temple opposite doors, thus having loosed the marriage tie. In Cochinchina the breaking of a pair of chopsticks in the presence of the couple is a legal form of divorce.—N. Y. Sun.

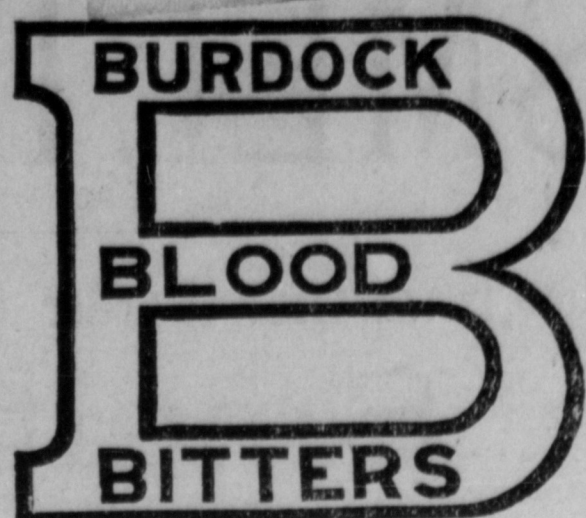

James Barnes, M. P. P., who has been at Chipman, Queen's Co., superintending the work in connection with the extension of the Central railway, of which he has the contract, returned to Buctouche Saturday.

Parties in Ontario are inquiring as to the prospect of getting lumber in sufficient quantities in Kent County for the manufacture of spool wood. They would need about five thousand cords annually. Mr. John Stevenson, Crown Land Surveyor, says their is plenty birch in the county suitable for the manufacture of spool wood.

There are now three and a half million acres of timber lands under lease, the largest in the history of the province. There are three million acres yet lying idle, but it is composed chiefly of burnt lands, and lands situated at the extreme end of small streams, which detract considerably from their value and popularity.—Gleaner.

Saturday morning before Judge Wells at his Chamber in Moncton, S. W. Palmer made application for review in the matter of James Goutreau vs. Philip M. Legere. Summons was granted returnable Dec. 6th 1895. This was an action of debt, tried before Justice Bourque in the County of Kent on the 26th day of Oct last and a verdict returned for plaintiff.

Schooner Matilda, of Richibucto, Captain Thomas Haines, with a cargo of hay from Charlottetown for Miramichi, put into this port for shelter on Thursday. She proceeded on her way Sunday afternoon, being delayed by part of her crew leaving, but only went as far as the Beach, Capt. Haines not caring about taking the risk of being frozen in the Miramichi. The cargo will be transhipped to Miramichi by rail.

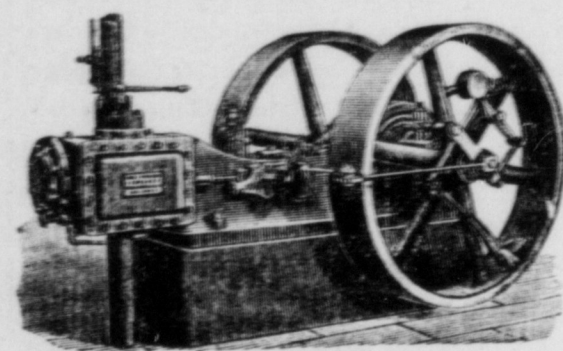
