**HEAVY INSURANCE.**—The late Mr. Byron G. Taylor carried \$125,000 of insurance on his life. Of this amount \$75,000 was ordinary life and \$50,000 accident insurance. The insurance is held in English, American and Canadian companies. Some time after he moved to England Mr. Taylor made his will, appointing his father, Captain Taylor, and Messrs. G. O. D. Otty and G. K. McLeod his executors. His wife is understood to have the interest of the money for the maintenance of herself and child, but it will eventually become the property of the child. Mrs. Taylor and child arrived here about ten days ago.—Globe.

**MR. ADAMS GETS THE PROPERTY.**—The difficulties about the sale of the St. Lawrence Lumber Company's property in Gloucester county have all been settled, and Mr. Samuel Adams, of New York, is now the owner of all the property. Mr. F. W. Sumner, of Moncton, had arranged for the purchase of a portion of the property with Mr. Allport, who represented the English bondholders, but the English receiver sold the property to Mr. Adams. At first a legal battle was expected, but that has been avoided. Mr. Novelle, representing the English trustees, came here and had a consultation with both Messrs. Adams and Sumner. The result was that Mr. Sumner relinquished his claim to the property, and the deed is now in Mr. Adams' possession. This settlement will be a great boon to the people of Gloucester, for men will be sent to the woods at once and active preparations made for next season's work. The prospects in the event of the legal fight were that the property would be idle. It is reported the new owners will at once undertake the erection of a railway from the Caraque line to Tracadie, for which subsidies are available. Another rumor is that Mr. T. D. Adams, who is associated with his brother, will probably be the Conservative candidate in the county. Mr. T. D. Adams has been living in New York for many years.—Globe.

The timidity of the mandarins, who dared not punish the robbers for fear of the vengeance of the rest of the band, was the reason why the townsman did not take their prisoners alive and hand them over to the authorities.
