THE WILDS OF AFRICA.

A Wonderful Race of Cannibals and Their Chief City.

Captain S. L. Hinde was in the Congo Medical Service during the recent war which has resulted in the expulsion of all the Arab slave traders from the Congo state. In his campaign he traveled through a part of the Congo basin that was almost unknown, and since his return home he has told some new and striking things about tribes that have never been visited before, who live about three hundred miles directly south of the northern bend of the Congo. There is a region here, north of the Sankuru River, about ninety thousand square miles in extent, that is almost a blank on the maps. The Arabs knew the country very well, however, for they had pursued the slave chase, using part of the natives to prey on the others. It was one of the most densely peopled parts of Africa until the Arab frays within the last few years made desolate a part of it. Capt. Hinde thinks he found in the Batela people of the region the most remarkable cannibals he has seen. Throughout the whole of their country, he says, the traveller sees neither gray hairs, nor halt, nor blind. The unfortunate who is marked by any physical imperfection is killed and eaten. Even parents are eaten by their children at the first sign of approaching decrepitude. These people are probably the only tribe in Africa who eat their own people. The effect, however, is not to deplete their numbers, but to make them superior, physically, to the tribes around them, for they do away only with those who are physically imperfect or upon whom old age is stealing. Captain Hinde says that they are a splendid race, and all the finer in appearance because they do not disfigure themselves with tattoo marks or by filing their teeth.

The Batela are a very numerous people. About ten thousand of their warriors were in the service of the great slave raider, Gongo Lutete, who helped the Arabs to capture a large part of their slaves. This long-headed chief made up his mind that it would pay him to cast in his fortunes with the whites and so he turned his back on his former employers and with his cannibal brigands helped to drive the Arabs out of the country.

Gongo's capital is a sight to behold. It is a fortified town on the Lomami river and each of its four gates is approached by a handsome pavement of human skulls, the bregma, or front part of the skull, being the only part showing above ground. Captain Hinde counted more than two thousand skulls in the pavement of one of the gates. Every tree in the town is crowned by a human skull. The practice of adorning trees with skulls is common among the more savage tribes throughout the Congo basin.

Captain Hinde participated in nearly all the big fights with the Arabs and some several thousand Arab forces chiefly armed with knives were killed. After the battle the cannibal camp followers and fighters among the states allies would have a great feast. In one battle over a thousand men fell, and Captain Hinde had the direction of the burial parties. He found only a few hundred heads and bones. The cannibals had carried off all the meat and in many cases the whole body for food. African cannibals, apparently never eat the flesh raw. They always boil or roast it. The white explorers have never been able to trace the beginnings of this horrid practice until during the Arab campaign, when they discovered that the Baluba tribe, of whom explorers have never spoken of as cannibals, have taken, of late years, to eating their enemies who are killed in battle. Only the men, however, indulge in this new custom.

Lobster Canning.

None but the packers themselves are to blame for the fact that the Canadian canning industry is below the high standard of excellence it should have long ago attained, and that in consequence of the uncertainty as to their quality Canadian canned goods do not command the best prices in the markets of the United Kingdom. English buyers complain particularly of the uncertain quality of Canadian lobsters, and say they run so unevenly that it is almost impossible to strike an average. As the Journal of Commerce points out, this is a matter the importance of which to Canadians can hardly be over-estimated. Only a few lobster packers take the precaution to line their tins with paper. The majority put the fish straight into the tin, and as the quality of the metal is not always what it is represented to be, this results in injury to the contents, more especially if the packer be one of those who gets his tins at the lowest possible cost without any regard to the character of the plate of which they are composed. Carelessness in soldering is another defect in Canadian lobster packing. The solder is frequently allowed to penetrate the contents, blackening and discoloring wherever it touches, and drops of the muriatic acid when carelessly used in the process of soldering fall in and thus the whole can is turned black. There are other defects less accidental, such as the boiling of lobsters not strictly fresh and filling up the centre of the cans with refuse from the shredding board. The more reputable canners do not resort to such dishonest practices, but they are indulged in by many in the business to an extent that has brought much discredit upon the Canadian lobster in the English market. The Journal of Commerce says a similar complaint is made of Canadian salmon, and "there are some lots of miserable white fish offering in this market today as British Columbia salmon which no reputable grocer could be induced to handle."

Absolute honesty and intelligent carefulness in packing, the use of the very best materials, together with neat and attractive packages are sure to pay in the long run, and so far as the trans-Atlantic market is concerned are essential factors in building up a successful trade. The packer who departs from this may be able to undercut his competitors and secure trade for a season, but the public soon discover when a brand is unreliable, and once a pack is discredited the recovery of its popularity is almost impossible.—Sun.

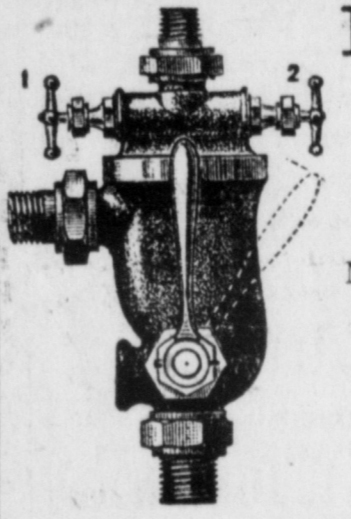
