GAME LAW AMENDMENTS.—The amendments to the game laws will prove of interest to all sportsmen. As regards big game—moose and caribou—the bill prevents hunters from snaring or trapping them and places the open season, September 15 to January 1 for each year. It is also provided that all hunters must get a license from the game warden of their county, paying therefore a fee of \$2. The other provisions of the bill refer to the shooting of birds. One section prevents for three years, the shooting or sale of partridges. The section does not interfere with the shooting of birds by sportsmen. The provision of the game law regarding black duck and teal are extended to all sea duck and other wild duck. Killing after dark by any means of ducks, geese, etc., is prohibited.

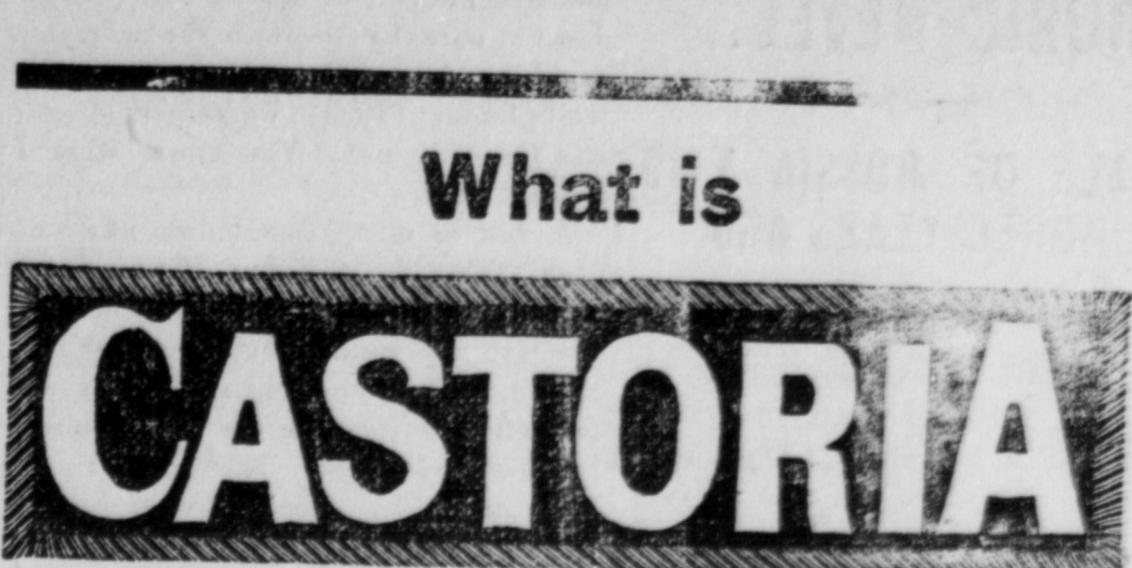

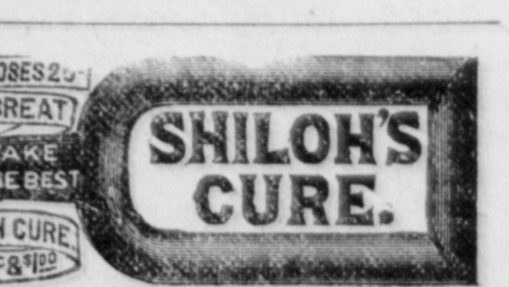
